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

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### **Foreword**

The District Census Handbook (DCHB), published by Census Organisation since 1951 Census, is one of the important publications in the context of planning and development at grass-root level. The publication, which is brought out for each district, contains several demographic and socip-economic characteristics village-wise and town-wise of the district alongwith the status of availability of civic amenities, infrastructural facilities, etc.

The scope of the DCHB was initially confined to a few Census Tables and Primary Census Abstract (PCA) of each village and town within the district. Thereafter, at successive Censuses, its scope and coverage has been enlarged. The DCHB published at the 1961 Census provided a descriptive account of the district, administrative statistics, census tables and a village and town directory including PCA. The 1971 Census-DCHB series was in three parts: Part-A related to village and town directory, Part-B to village and town PCA and Part-C comprised analytical report, administrative statistics, district census tables and certain analytical tables based on PCA and amenity data in respect of villages. The 1981 Census DCHB was in two parts: Part-A contained village and town directory and Part-B the PCA of village and town including the SCs and STs PCA up to tahsil/town levels. New features alongwith restructuring of the formats of village and town directory were added into it. In Village Directory, all amenities except electricity were brought together and if any amenity was not available in the referent village, the distance in broad ranges from the nearest place having such an amenity, was given. Information on new items such as adult literacy centres, primary health sub-centres and community health workers in the village were provided so as to meet the requirements of some of the Revised Minimum Needs Psrogramme. Information on approach to the village was provided for the first time in the Village Directory so as to give the details on number of inaccessible villages in each district. In the Town Directory, a (IV-A) on slums was introduced to provide the details on civic and other amenities in the notified slums of Class I and Class II towns.

The 1991 Census DCHB, by and large, followed the pattern of presentation of 1981 Census, except the format of PCA was restructured. Nine –fold industrial classification of main workers was given against the four-fold industrial classification presented in the 1981 Census. In addition, sex-wise population in 0-6 age group was included in the PCA for the first time with a view to enable the data users to compile more realistic literacy rate as all children below 7 years of age had been treated as illiterate at the time of 1991 Census. One of the important innovations in the 1991 Census was the Community Development Block (CD block) level presentation of village directory and PCA data instead of the traditional tahsil/taluk/PS level presentation. It was expected that the presentation of village directory and PCA data at CD block level will help the planners in formulation of micro level development plans, CD block being the lowest administrative unit.

The present series of 2001 Census DCHBs have been made more informative and exhaustive in terms of coverage and content. The Village Directory has been enlarged in scope by including a number of other facilities like banking, recreational and cultural facilities, newspapers and magazines and 'most important commodity' manufactured in village. Income and expenditure of gram panchayat, wherever possible, has been provided. Apart from these, more details on distance(s) at which basic amenities are available (if not available in the village), are given. This includes educational facilities (namely primary

and middle schools and college), medical facilities (viz. Allopathic Hospital, Maternity & Child Welfare Centre and Primary Health Centre), drinking water, post & telegraph (post office and phone), communication, bank, credit societies and recreational facilities. In town directory, the statement on Slums has been modified and its coverage enlarged by including details on all slums instead of 'notified slums'. The information is given in case of all statutory towns irrespective of their class, against only Class I and Class II towns in the 1981 and 1991 Censuses. The basic amenities available in the villages and towns are analysed in depth with the help of a number of cross-classified inset tables and statements. Two other significant additions in the publication are inclusion of 'motif' highlighting significant characteristic of the district and analytical notes as annexures. The analytical notes on (i) fertility and mortality and (ii) various measures of fertility and mean age at marriage are prepared based on 1991 Census. Whereas, in the notes relating to (i) percentage distribution of migrants by place of birth/place of last residence, (ii) main religions, (iii) marital status of population, (iv) age, sex and education, and (v) distribution of spectrum of mother tongue, nature and extent of changes occurred in the district in its basic socio-demographic features during the decade 1991-2001 are analysed. The eight digits permanent location code (PLCN) in all the villages and towns have been assigned keeping in view the future needs.

The village and town level amenity data have been collected, compiled and computerized in prescribed record structure under the supervision of Shri Shamlal Goyal, IAS, Director of Census Operations, Chandigarh U.T. Thereafter, efforts have bee made to ensure comparability of the information with that of 1991 Census data and the information brought out by the respective State Governments in their annual reports and statistical handbooks for the various years after 1991. The task of planning, designing and coordination of this publication was carried out by Shri R.G.Mitra, Deputy Registrar General, (C&T) and Dr. I.C.Agrawal, Senior Research Officer of Social Studies Division. Dr. R.P. Singh, Deputy Registrar General (Map) provided the technical guidance in the preparation of maps. Whereas, Shri Anil Kumar Arora, Deputy Director of Data Processing Division who worked under the overall supervision of Shri Himakar, Addl. Director (EDP) helped in preparation of record structure for computerization of village and town directory data and the programme for the generation of Village Directory and Town Directory statements including analytical inset tables. The draft DCHB manuscripts received from the Census Directorates have been scrutinised in the Social Studies Division under the guidance of Shri S. L. Jain, Deputy Director and Shri R. K. Mehta, Assitant Director. I am thankful to all of them and others who contributed to make this publication possible.

### **Preface**

Publication of the District Census Handbooks (DCHBs) was initiated after the 1951 census and is continuing since then with innovations/modifications after each decennial census. This is the most valuable district level publication brought out by the census organization on behalf of each State government/Union Territory administration. It inter-alia provides data/information on some of the basic demographic and socio-economic characteristics and on the availability of certain important civic amenities/facilities in each village and town of the respective districts.

The District Census Handbook has two segments: part A and part B. Part A primarily deals with village and town Directory and part B contains Primary Census Abstract of each village and town of the District. The 1991 Census data presentation both in Part A and Part B of this book was the transition from traditional presentation at Tahsil level to C.D. block level and this pattern continued in 2001 census as well.

For the first time in 2001 census, the District Census Handbooks are being made available in electronic format.

The District Census Handbook is the joint collaboration of the Census Directorate and the Chandigarh Administration. On behalf of the Chandigarh Administration, this Directorate has prepared the manuscript of this book.

The District Census Handbooks of 2001 have some additional information which is based on the 2001 census as compared to the previous censuses like capturing of information on participation of women in economic activities, netting all the children in age-group 0-14 as also elderly people of age 60 years and above. The data about the number of handicapped persons including partial disability has also been collected in 2001 census for the whole of India. The most important methodological innovation introduced in 2001 census relate to carving out separate slum enumeration blocks.

The data being presented in this publication have been collected and compiled under the direction of Shri N.S. Bhadauria, Deputy Director of Census Operations, U.T. Chandigarh and Shri Vinod Ji Talashi, Assistant Director. For the preparation of manuscript of this book, I received wholehearted cooperation from all the Heads of Departments, Heads of offices of the Chandigarh Administration, Estate office and Deputy Commissioner, Chandigarh and a large number of dedicated field staff of Chandigarh Administration and from experienced Census staff of this office. I am grateful to all of them for their valuable contribution in the accomplishment of this task of national importance. I must place on record the co-operation extended to me by the press media and electronic media to make the census taking a great success in the Union Territory, Chandigarh.

I am deeply grateful to Shri J.K. Banthia, IAS the Registrar General and Census Commissioner, India, New Delhi for the valuable guidance and advice at every step till the finalisation of this handbook. I also express my thanks to Shri I.C. Agrawal, Senior Research Officer (Social Studies Division) and Shri S.L. Jain, Deputy Director ORGI, New Delhi for preparing the set of instructions for the compilation of the village and Town Directory and other inset tables etc. being inserted in this District Census Handbook.

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
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# **Map - Chandigarh District**



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## **District Highlights - 2001 Census**

- 1. Chandigarh U.T., which is a uni-district and uni-tahsil territory, came into existence on 1st November, 1966.
- 2. Chandigarh district is one of the most urbanized districts in northern India with 89.8 percent urban population to total population.
- 3. It has an area of 114.0 sq. km.
- 4. Chandigarh district has a density of 7,900 persons per sq.km.
- 5. Chandigarh is one of the most literate district of northern India with 71.2 percent literacy rate, i.e. 75.3 percent among males, and 66.0 percent among females.
- 6. Chandigarh district has only 24 villages, which comprises of 23 inhabited villages and 1 uninhabited village.
- 7. The district of Chandigarh is mostly inhabited by service class, people migrated mostly from adjoining States of Punjab, Haryana and Himachal Pradesh.
- 8. Chandigarh disrict has only one City i.e. Chandigarh itself which is famous and known as 'the City Beautiful'. It is one of the most well planned cities of the world.

The above statement presents the population of the district for total, rural and urban for each Census from 1901 to 2001 Census along with decadal variation between each Census. As per the statement the maximum growth of population was recorded during 1951-61 with 394.1 percent. This abnormal increase attributes to the reason that Chandigarh City was in the process of construction and development as one of the well-planned and modern cities of the world, which attracted people from nearby states to settle down in Chandigarh. The growth of population during the decade 1981-91 was at the level of 42.2 percent which has slightly come down to 40.3 percent during the recent decade 1991-2001. The rural and urban growth has been recorded as 39.2 and 40.4 percent respectively.

Besides giving the district area for total, rural & urban the statement gives the number of inhabitated and uninhabitated villages in the Chandigarh Union Territory. It has 23 inhabited and 1 uninhabited village with only one statutory town i.e. Chandigarh. It has no Census Town in 2001. It has 206,465 households as per 2001 Census. The total population for the Union Territory has been recorded as 900,635 with 506,938 males and 393,697 females. The density of population for the total, rural and urban area has been worked out as 7,900, 2,655 and 10,196 respectively.



Statement 9 gives the number of houseless and institutional households with sex-wise population. There are 757 houseless households with 2,722 persons comprising 2,588 males and 134 females while 573 institutional households have been recorded with 16,510 persons comprising 11,985 males and 4,525 females in Chandigarh U.T. at 2001 census. Both the houseless and institutional population is more in urban than in rural areas.



### **Analytical Note**

### (i) History and Scope of the District Census Handbook

The compilation of District Census Handbook is an innovation of the 1951 Census. District is considered as the most important unit for presentation of Census data. Census Statistics are also compiled for individual villages and towns, as they constitute the basic units of human habitation. Besides this, some other useful information pertaining to the land and the people has also been included in it to make it a self-contained book of reference for the District. It was, however, not altogether a new idea, since census data for smaller units were published in earlier censuses also in one form or the other. For the first time in 1891 District wise list of villages were published giving the population of each village. At the 1911 Census, data of villages were published in the form of village directory. Such village directories were again compiled in the shape of District Census Statistics at the 1921 Census. Finally, District Census Handbooks emerged as regular decennial publication since 1951 Census. The demand for the basic data for the smallest administrative unit was greatly felt in the post-independence era. The ushering in an era of planning and development in the wake of launching of Five-year plans after attaining independence, urgent need for detailed data at village level was felt. Thus, when the proposal to bring out District Census Handbook was put before the State Government, they readily agreed for the compilation and printing of District Census Handbooks through their respective Directors of Census Operations, under the authority of local government concerned. The general appreciation and utility of this handbook encouraged the Census Organisation to increase the scope of publication.

The tradition thus built up has been continued in the present series of District Census Handbooks. In the 1971 Census, it had been decided to bring out these handbooks in three parts viz; Parts A, B and C. In respect of Chandigarh Union Territory, Parts A and B of this publication had been printed in one volume and part C as a separate volume. During 1981 Census, it had been decided to print it in two parts viz. Parts A and B separately. However, in respect of Chandigarh Union Territory, it was decided to print it in a single volume as Chandigarh is a small Union Territory and its volume is bound to be slim. Part A of this handbook consists of village and Town Directory and part B gives data on Primary Census Abstract (PCA). In 1991 Census also, the same pattern was adopted publishing Parts A and B in a single volume. However, in this census some of the non-census data included e.g. information on girl schools, social forestry areas etc. whereas items like staple food and information on newspapers etc. have been omitted.

In the present Census also the District Census Handbook is being brought out in a single volume which contain the village and town directory as also the Primary Census Abstract and it should certainly meet the requirements of the planners involved in micro level planning. Similarly, additional data revealing civic and other amenities in town has been presented especially in respect of slum dewellers. Scholars and planners alike should benefit from the data on amenities.

#### (ii) Brief history of the District

Chandigarh Union Territory is a uni-district territory comprising only one town i.e. Chandigarh surrounded by 24 villages. The history of Chandigarh, 'the city beautiful' begins with the partition of the Indian subcontinent; Lahore, the historic capital of undivided Punjab, having gone to west Punjab, (now in Pakistan), the need for a new capital for East Punjab arose. For a while the Government of East Punjab functioned at Jalandhar. Thereafter, as a makeshift arrangement, Shimla became the seat of Government. However, that place was not found suitable for a permanent seat of Government. Several claims were put and finally the

present site was chosen for the capital city due to its natural surroundings, viz. Patiali Rao on the west, Sukhna Choe on the east, the Monsoon Rivers and Siwalik Hills on the north east which make for a check on the haphazard growth of the city. The other reasons for selecting this site were healthy climate, fertile land for growing trees, fruits and vegetables, plentiful supply of water and availability of building materials like stone, sand and cement nearby. The city was named after "Chandi" the Goddess of bravery. The holy shrine of Goddess "Chandi" is located on Chandigarh-Kalka road at a distance of about 12 Kms, now in the State of Haryana. The Chandigarh city is a model of architectural grandeur, which is displayed, in its beautiful layout and monumental buildings. Le-corbusier's architectural talent is best expressed through designing of buildings for Secretariat, Vidhan Sabha, High Court and Open Hand Monument. From the distance, the Secretariat looks like a ship, Assembly building like a pilot ship and High Court as harbour with the Siwaliks in the backdrop. The Open Hand Monument is a novel idea of Le-corbusier and Pt. Jawahar Lal Nehru to depict openness of mind, creativity, its richness and also the instincts to share this richness with one and all. It also symbolizes blessed hand of the Almighty bestowing peace and prosperity. The city has a variety of buildings. The houses are specially designed to suit climatic conditions. A variety of patterns have been evolved to give a pleasing effect.

During the past fifty years, Independent India saw three new State capitals built, Chandigarh for Punjab, Bhubaneshwar for Orissa and Gandhinagar for Gujarat. Of the three, Chandigarh is the most visible and has attracted worldwide attention, not because it happened to be the first one but because it was built at a delicate juncture: India had won independence but the partition of the country led to the largest ever migration of people that the world had ever seen. Given those uncertain days, the idea of developing a brand new State capital for a battered Punjab was an act of profound courage; its leaders were facing extraordinarily difficult circumstances, yet they dared to look forward. The venture of building a new city at that point of time was an act of faith in the country and its people.

Free India's first Prime Minister Pt. Jawahar Lal Nehru wished Chandigarh to be "a symbol of new India unfettered by the traditions of the past". While it is true that when a new city, howsoever, meticulously planned, becomes a living entity, gathering its own rhythm and momentum, certain changes inevitably occur. The felt needs change the original design mandate and many new factors emerge that could never have been foreseen much less provided for.

Historically, Chandigarh was conceived to serve, as the new capital of one State, namely Punjab. At the time of birth nobody could have dreamt that Punjab would undergo yet another division barely 20 years after its inception, and that Chandigarh would be made to serve as the capital of two States, each claiming exclusive rights over it. The year 1966 saw the creation of two unilingual States, Punjab and Haryana; carved out from the previously bilingual State. Actually the Shah Commission appointed by the Central Government for effectuating the division of the bilingual Punjab awarded the new city of Chandigarh to Haryana. This created a furore, and "at the epicentre of this political change was Chandigarh, which found itself caught between Haryana and Punjab, each State demanding the city as its own capital". Taking cognisance of strong sentiments, the Central Government rejected the commission's recommendation and, instead, made Chandigarh a "Union Territory". The new city was brought under its direct administration and Chandigarh was made to serve, as the "joint capital" of both Punjab and Haryana, and the two States "were made to share the city on a 60:40 ratio".

Rajiv Gandhi as Prime Minister awarded Chandigarh to Punjab and as compensation sanctioned Rs. 200 Crore for Haryana to build a new capital city. Since then, Punjab and Haryana became "tenant States" of the Central Government, though, ironically, neither Punjab nor Haryana has so far paid any rent on buildings while each has been utilising Chandigarh and its urban amenities since 1966. In the meantime both States have also developed adjunct extensions; Punjab developed Mohali (called Sahibzada Ajit Singh Nagar) while Haryana has developed Panchkula on the northeastern end of this city beautiful.

ANALYTICAL NOTE 5

Being immediately south of Chandigarh, Mohali could, in a sense, be considered an extension of the original plan as conceived by Le-corbusier and his team; it follows the same grid and sector pattern.

Planned and built northeast of Chandigarh, Panchkula is different in its form and design pattern. Though both Mohali and Panchkula follow almost the same planning space standards, the quality of urban services in both these cities as compared to Chandigarh leaves much to be desired. Chandigarh is now fast emerging as an upcoming metropolis.

As a matter of fact, the planners of Chandigarh did foresee the possibility of haphazard development all around Chandigarh. Therefore, to protect the peripheral areas around the new Capital City, the Punjab (new capital) Periphery Control Act, 1952 was promulgated. This legislation aimed to safeguard the vulnerable peripheral land around the newly planned city.

Unfortunately, "things did not happen the way they were envisaged". This legislation like many other laws of the land was not effectively enforced and the result has been the emergence of several so-called "planned" townships around the city, all in defiance of the Act. As a result, all such "developments" has laid pressure on Chandigarh's limited urban infrastructure, besides creating traffic congestion, environmental pollution and many other problems.

The words of President K. R. Narayanan while inaugurating the International Conference on 50 years of Chandigarh is apt: "Chandigarh is not a castle built in the air. The architecture of Chandigarh could not ignore the compelling needs of Indian Society and the stubborn cultural values despite all its freedom from the fetters of past traditions. There is no city planning that could succeed in the face of our society, habits of our people, lapses of administration and lack of education and health. All said and done, Chandigarh is still the best city and is the cynosure of all eyes"

#### (iii) Administrative Setup

Chandigarh is a uni-district and uni-tahsil territory. In 1981 Census, two more Census Towns i.e. Burail and Attawa were added to the existing two towns of Chandigarh and Mani Majra NAC. In 1991 Census one more Census Town was added known as Mani Majra Rural.

But in 2001 Census all the three Census Towns got merged with the core town of Chandigarh. Chandigarh now comes under the jurisdiction of Municipal Corporation. A notification was issued in this regard by the Chandigarh Administration. It comprises of 20 Wards as per notification. However, the administrative control of Chandigarh Union Territory lies with the Chandigarh Administration. The Governor of Punjab State runs the Administration with the help of Advisor, Home Secretary, the Finance Secretary and the Deputy Commissioner. During 2001 Census, rural area comprises of 24 villages. As per revenue record, four villages namely Jhumaroo, Nizampur Burail, Nizampur Kumbra and Chahar-Tarf-Burail are uninhabited villages. But practically the only village Chahar-Tarf-Burail is uninhabited as the population is still living in all these villages except Chahar-Tarf-Burail. The Tahsildar (Revenue) is the incharge of the rural area of the uni-tahsil of Chandigarh Union Territory who works under the direct control of Deputy Commissioner. Mani Majra Rural, Census Town of 1991, has been partly merged with Chandigarh statutory town and the remaining part has been considered as village namely Mani Majra (Rural) in 2001 Census. Mani Majra (Rural) Census Town of 1991 and presently a village in 2001 census comprises of two hamlets of Kishangarh and Bhagwanpura.

Like district and tahsil there is only one C.D. block of Chandigarh Union Territory, which is comprised of the entire rural area of Chandigarh having 24 villages.

#### (iv) Physical features

#### Location and size:

**Latitude & Longitude:** Chandigarh lies between 30°40′5″ and 30°47′45″ north latitudes and 76°42′15″ and 76°51′5″ east longitudes.

**Surrounding area of the District :** Chandigarh emerged as a Union Territory as a result of reorganisation of erstwhile Punjab State with effect from 1<sup>st</sup> November 1966 under the reorganisation Act, 1966. It is bounded by Punjab on three sides and by Haryana in the east.

North-south/East-west extension: About two hundred kilometers north of New Delhi at the foot of Siwalik range, overlooked by the magnificent Himalayan mountains stands Chandigarh which houses the Capital of Punjab and Haryana States besides being the seat of Chandigarh Union Territory Administration. It is linked with all prominent cities and towns of Punjab and Haryana States.

### Physiography:

Chandigarh is a single District Union Territory, which was created on 1<sup>st</sup> November 1966 as a result of trifurcation of erstwhile Punjab State into Punjab, Haryana and Himachal Pradesh. Since both Haryana and Punjab put their claim on Chandigarh City, so it was decided to keep it as a joint capital of both the States under Central Government Administration as a separate Union Territory till the Central Government could decide about its transfer. It has an area of 114 Km<sup>2</sup> – inhabited by 900,635 persons in 2001 Census conveying a density of 7,900 persons per Km<sup>2</sup>.

Regional Divisions of Chandigarh: Geologically, the region is made up of Alluvium (Recent) except some northeastern parts where Siwalik (Mio-Pleistocene) structure is found. Chandigarh has monsoonal and continental type of climate. It has a climate with bracing winter, a pleasant rainy season and a reasonably hot summer.

Chandigarh alluvial plain is known for wheat, maize and sugarcane crops and was dotted with groves of mango trees. There were giant Pipal trees (Ficus religiara) near village sites. In 1952, a tree preservation order was passed, prohibiting the cutting down and destruction of trees. On account of this order, a large number of venerable mango trees, clumps of date palms and groves of the flame of the forest (Butea Monosperma) have been retained in the green belts, thus preserving an illusion of great age. Chandigarh Administration has acquired some area on lease from Punjab and Haryana to create small tracks of forests. There is about 2,542 hectares of forests in Kansal (leased from Punjab) and Nepali (leased from Haryana) and some area in Raipur Khurd village of Chandigarh Union Territory. The Forest Department is doing extensive work for soil conservation in Sukhna Lake catchment area in order to check silting of the lake and for raising a green belt around the city.

Eucaliptus, Khair, Kikar, Shisham, Phulahi and Bamboo are the important species found here.

In July 1953, a Landscape Committee was organised under the Chairmanship of Sh. M.S. Randhawa. This Committee provided coordination between the engineers, architects, horticulturists and forest officers. Le Corbusier who was one of the members of the Committee suggested the preparation of a chart showing shapes of trees and colour of flowers. This simple chart presented a classification of selected, beautiful, ornamental flowering and foliage trees of India which may be called the aristocrats of the plants kingdom and provided the basis of all tree planting in Chandigarh. As shade was quickly required on the roads, it was suggested that fast growing trees like Melia Azedarach and Sesbanea Grandiflora be planted. Shelter belts of Dalbergia Sisso were planted along the beds of seasonal rivulets so that dust may not blow into the city during dry and hot months of May and June. Hybrid Eucalyptus has been planted to the north and on the banks of the lake. A striking feature of the landscaping schemes of Chandigarh is the profuse use made of flowering trees, which flower, from month to month. In addition to aesthetic aspects, trees in the city areas constitute an effective buffer against dust and noise and also act as windbreaker. Some of the parks in Chandigarh have been planted exclusively with forests of the Eucalyptus, Kadamba and the Yellow Siris (Albizzea Procera). These are all giant trees, which are gregarious, and when grown in large numbers create a beautiful effect. To the north of the city, the Siwalik presents a problem of soil conservation during monsoon. To save them from dissolving, these were planted with trees and shrubs of different types.

Within the broad frame work of a physiogeographic regional plan for different regions of the States/Union Territories, the frame work of an area development plan at the District level should illustrate two things, one is a land use plan and other one is of the proposed integration of villages around some important settlements as the focal points. This could convey the nature of services and amenities needed by the people in the focal ANALYTICAL NOTE 7

point and its surrounding villages. The regional planning takes notes of the two-way process in which the national plan ought to be formulated i.e. translating the national plan downwards through different ladders of the administrative hierarchy and simultaneous aggregation upwards.

The Union Territory of Chandigarh falls in region number 2.1.2 Hoshiarpur-Chandigarh Sub-Mountane Plain and has been divided into following two sub-micro regions keeping in view physiogeographic factors:

1. Chandigarh Siwalik: Chandigarh Siwalik forms the northeastern part of the District, covering three villages namely Kaimbwala, Khuda Alisher and Lahora. It has an area of 8.09 Km<sup>2</sup>, which is inhabited by 6,899 persons (entirely rural). It is bounded by Punjab in the north and northeast, by Haryana in the east, by Chandigarh plain in the south and west. The region has Ochrepts-Orthents types of soil. Ochrepts are shallow black, brown and alluvial soils of northern region whereas Orthents are recently formed soils. Its northern fringes have Siwalik-Mio-Pleistocene geological structure while southern parts have geological structure of Alluvium-Recent. On its southeastern border, Sukhna Lake is existing. In order to check silting of the lake, Forest Department of the Union Territory is doing extensive work for soil conservation in the catchments area which mostly falls in this region. Eucalyptus, Khair, Kikar, Shisham, Phulahi and Bamboo are the important species found here. Kaimbwala is an important village dominantly inhabited by Gujjar community whose main occupation is rearing of cattle and selling of milk. The traditional marketing centre of the inhabitants of Kaimbwala is Manimajra, which can be reached by a Kutcha road by crossing over the generally dried up river bed of Sukhna Choe and territory of Haryana through Suketri village. Chandigarh City is the marketing centre for the inhabitants of Khuda Alisher and Lohara villages, which are connected by road with Chandigarh. The density of population in the region is 853 persons per Km<sup>2</sup>. The variation in density during the decade (1981-91) in this region is 348 persons per Km<sup>2</sup>. Whereas in Chandigarh Plain it is 1,770 persons per Km<sup>2</sup> which is five times from what is the density variation in Chandigarh Siwalik. Growth of

population in this region has been recorded as high as 68.5 per cent during 1981-91. Though there is no urban centre in this region yet relatively high growth of population is mainly associated with its close proximity to the city of Chandigarh where comparatively high rents forced the people to find cheaper accommodation in this region. Literacy rate is 67.6 per cent in this region while sex ratio is as low as 769 indicating high male immigration. It has 1,454 persons belonging to Scheduled Castes out of a total of 6,899 in the rural areas of the District. Total rural literates in the District are 31,953, of which 3,781 reside in this region. Out of a total population of 6,899 persons, 2,290 are main workers in Chandigarh Siwalik. The strength of marginal workers in this region is 22 and all are males only.

So far means of communications and transportations are concerned, the region is less developed. Since the region is located adjacent to Chandigarh City, many employees of Chandigarh have taken accommodation in these villages and are daily commuters. The impact of Chandigarh City is quite visible in this region.

2. Chandigarh Plain: Chandigarh plain is a fertile alluvial plain, consisting of 22 villages and 5 urban centres, including 2 outgrowths. It is bounded by Punjab and Chandigarh Siwalik in the north, by Haryana in the east, by Punjab again in the south and west. With an area of 105.9 Kms<sup>2</sup>, it is inhabited by 635,116 persons, of which 59,287 reside in rural areas and 575,829 in urban areas. Five urban centres are Chandigarh City, Manimajra town, Manimajra (Rural) Census Town, Burail Census Town and Attawa Census Town. Chandigarh City is the biggest urban centre with a population of 575,829 persons including the outgrowths of Buterla and Badheri. The region (Chandigarh Plain) contains 92.9 per cent of the total area of the Union Territory of Chandigarh where 98.9 per cent of the total population resides. Chandigarh Plain also accommodates 99.1 per cent of the total literates and 99.0 per cent of the total main workers of Union Territory of Chandigarh. This region experienced 41.9 per cent growth rate of population during 1981-91 while variation in density in this region is 1,770 persons per square Kilometre during the last decade, which speaks loudly of over population than

what was planned for Chandigarh. The northwest and southeast peripheries of Chandigarh City are bounded by dry beds of Sukhna Choe and Patiali Rao. These are seasonal rivers and the quantity of water is dependent on the rainfall in their catchment areas. Sukhna Lake is located on its northern parts. The Siwalik on its northeast, dry beds of seasonal rivers on southeast and northwest periphery, make natural barrier for the expansion of the city in these directions. Southwest is the only side towards which the city may naturally expand and is expanding to meet the growing demand of its population. The city is the joint capital of Punjab State and Haryana State, besides the head-quarters of the Union Territory of Chandigarh. The city is known for its academic and educational facilities. It is one of the most modern cities of the world. The present urban form of Chandigarh derives from the well-ordered matrix of the generic 'Neighbourhood unit' - the Sector and the hierarchical circulation pattern originating from the Le Corbusier's theory of 7 Vs with a regular intersection of the fast traffic V-3 roads defining each 'Sector'.

The region is well developed in terms of the means of communications and transportations. National Highway 21 and broad gauge railway line pass through this region. Chandigarh City is well connected with roads. Chandigarh has a 'GRID' plan, as most planned cities, inevitably tend to have. It is a rectangular grid 800 metres x 1200 metres. The space contained within the grid is called a 'Sector' which is the basic planning unit of the city. The dimension of the grid is based on the assumption that each sector should be self-sufficient for the essential daily needs of living and each requirement should be met within walking distance inside sector. Each sector is surrounded by vehicular roads called V-3s (the Grid) from which access to the sector is available at four controlled points situated approximately at the bisector of each surrounding length or road. The green space is meant to feed the recreational, educational, social and spiritual needs of the sector. Thus schools, health centres, community centres, playing fields are located in this space, places of worship are also located nearby. A residential sector seeks to provide all the educational needs of its residents upto the junior secondary stage but in practice this cannot be adhered to as some children prefer schools located in other sectors than their own. Besides some sectors have schools exclusively for girls and some for boys.

As already mentioned the planning unit of the city is a sector but there are some variations which comprise the special areas and which do not follow the planning concept of a typical residential sector. There are following four main work centres in the Chandigarh City:

- (i) The capitol complex which was the seat of the erstwhile Punjab Government upto the reorganisation of Punjab State in November 1966, is being used by the Governments of Punjab and Haryana. It consists of the Legislative Assembly, the Secretariat and the High Court. These can also be called, law making, law executing and law interpreting premises.
- (ii) The City and District centres in Sector 17 are in the heart of the city. Some of the administrative offices of Chandigarh Union Territory and the State Governments are located here. The city centre is essentially the civic centre and the commercial centre of the city.
- (iii) Chandigarh was not conceived as an industrial city. It was meant to be an administrative centre and an educational centre. But an area on the southeast periphery is set aside as an industrial area. The idea was that any city now requires a service industry to keep the city going, for example, motor vehicle repairs, manufacturing of furniture, doors, windows, hardware, kitchenware, electric goods, transistors, gas cookers, soft drinks, miscellaneous goods of daily use, etc.
- (iv) The zone of under-graduate, post-graduate studies and spiritual and temporal health of the whole city is located in the northwest.

The circulation of the city has been classified according to different types and speeds of traffic. The types of roads are:

- V-1: Road connecting two towns;
- V-2: Multipurpose arterial road with fast and slow carriage ways, cycle and pedestrian tracks;
- V-3: Fast straight traffic road on the periphery of a sector;

V-4: Shopping street with shops on southwest side only and open areas for car parking. These are winding streets intended to slow down traffic:

V-5 : Distributory road within a sector leading to groups of housing;

V-6: Feeder road to individual houses;

V-7: Pedestrian path and

V-8: Cycle track.

Chandigarh City of this region has developed a unique and rich character closely related with the composition of its society. No longer merely bureaucratic, the city has a generous sprinkling of social, political, economic and intellectual elites who dictate the pattern of its life. Its sizeable student community-foreigners (particularly-Thais, Negroes, Iranis) and Indians suffuses it with colour, vitality and elegance. Chandigarh is fast becoming a cosmopolitan city and reflects the moods, life-styles and culture of its variegated population. The region is culturally rich and has congenial climate for its expansion.

## **Drainage:**

There are variations in the altitude ranging between 325 to 400 metres. Except for some offshoots of the Siwalik range touching the north-eastern boundary of the U.T. where the altitude is more than 400 metres, the remaining area is plain with a gradual slope towards south providing a natural and ideal drainage system. The three seasonal streamlets of importance are Sukhna choe, Attawa Choe and Patiali Rao, which not only run through the Union Territory but also serve as natural drainage. The most important water body and a centre of great tourist attraction is the picturesque Sukhna Lake lying in the north-east.

#### Climate:

January and June are the months during which the lowest and highest temperatures have been recorded respectively. With the onset of monsoon in July the temperature starts declining. A major part of the annual rainfall is received during June to October. The other period of rainfall is in winter months from October to March. But the rainfall is scanty. The summer rainfall is caused by the southwest monsoon, which is beneficial for kharif crops. The winter rainfall caused by cyclones is also significant for rabi crops.

#### Soils:

The region had ochrepts – orthents types of soil. While the ochrepts are shallow black brown and alluvial soils of the northern region, orthents are the recently formed soils. The northern fringes of the Union Territory have Siwalik (Mio-Pleistocene) geological structure. While southern parts have geological structure of alluvium. On its north-eastern side lies the Sukhna Lake. In order to check silting of the lake the Forest Department of the Union Territory is doing extensive work on soil conservation in the catchment area. Soils are good for growing wheat, maize and sugarcane crops.

## **Cropping pattern:**

Chandigarh is mostly urbanised having 79.3 sq. Kms urban area while the rural area is only 34.7 sq. Kms. Wheat and Maize are the main crops grown here. The land use pattern has been classified under the sub heads as forest, irrigated, unirrigated, culturable waste and area not available for cultivation.

#### Forests:

Forests are those lands, which are administered, as forests under legal enactment and which are State or private owned. These do not include any land, which is being put to some agricultural use. There is hardly any forest in the Union Territory of Chandigarh, but Chandigarh Administration has been able to have small tracks of forests by acquiring some area on lease from Punjab and Haryana States. There is about 2,542 hectares of forest area in Kansal (leased from Punjab) and Nepli (leased from Haryana) forest and some area in Raipur Khurd village of Chandigarh Union Territory.

#### **Irrigated lands:**

Irrigated lands are those lands, which are sown with crops and orchards and are irrigated. The common source of irrigation is tubewell. The water level in the northern and north-eastern villages is generally very low, but position in other villages is comparatively better. According to 2001 village directory, the irrigated area is 1,777.0 hectares.

## **Unirrigated lands:**

Unirrigated lands are those, which are sown with crops and orchards including the current fallows, but which are not irrigated by any means. Unirrigated area is 377.6 hectares as per the village directory.

#### Culturable waste:

This includes land fit for cultivation, whether or not taken up for cultivation but is not cultivated for more than 5 years in succession. The area under culturable waste comes to 306.8 hectares as per the village directory.

#### Area not available for cultivation:

This includes land not available for cultivation such as barren, unculturable land and land put to non-agricultural uses such as buildings, roads, railways, water works etc. This Union Territory being mainly urban, a greater part of the land has been utilised for construction of houses, roads, railway station and railway tracks, work shops, factories, godowns, parks etc., which are common pattern of urban areas. Land available for cultivation is mostly located in the villages, which is shrinking due to greater demand for some more profitable non-agricultural uses.

#### Flora and Fauna:

Ki Kar (Accasia arabica), Barota, Pipal (Ficus religiosa), Shisham (Dalbergia Sissoo) and Neem are the common trees found in this Union Territory. Mango (Mangifera indica) trees are found in the rural as well as in the urban areas.

Jackal, hare, wild bear, wild cats are a common sight in the villages of northern side of this Union Territory, which is close to Siwalik hills. Parrots, multicoloured sparrows, pigeons, crows, doves, gatar, nightingale and kite are common birds found here.

## (v) Census concepts

#### **Building:**

A 'Building' is generally a single structure on the ground. Sometimes it is made up of more than one component unit which are used or likely to be used as dwellings (residences) or establishments such as shops, business houses, offices, factories, workshops, worksheds, Schools, places of entertainment, places of worship, godowns, stores etc. It is also possible that building which have component units may be used for a combination of purposes such as shop-cum-residence, workshop-cum-residence, office-cum-residence etc.

Usually a structure will have four walls and a roof. But in some areas the very nature of construction of houses is such that there may not be any wall. Such is the case of conical structures where entrance is also provided but they may not have any walls. Therefore, such of the conical structures are also treated as separate buildings.

#### **Permanent houses:**

Houses, the walls and roof of which are made of permanent materials. The material of walls can be any one from the following, namely, galvanized iron sheets or other metal sheets, asbestos sheets, burnt bricks, stones or concrete. Roof may be made of from any one of the following materials, namely, tiles, slate, galvanized iron sheets, metal sheets, asbestos sheets, bricks, stones or concrete.

## **Semi-permanent houses:**

Houses in which either the wall or the roof is made of permanent material and the other is made of temporary material.

#### **Temporary houses:**

Houses in which both walls and roof are made of materials, which have to be replaced frequently. Walls may be made from any one of the following temporary materials, namely, grass, thatch, bamboo, plastic, polythene, mud, unburnt bricks or wood. Roof may be made from any one of the following temporary materials, namely, grass, thatch, bamboo, wood, mud, plastic or polythene.

## **Dwelling Room:**

A room is treated as a dwelling room if it has walls with a doorway and a roof and should be wide and long enough for a person to sleep in, i.e. it should have a length of not less than 2 meters and a breadth of at least 1.5 meters and a height of 2 meters. A dwelling room would include living room, bedroom, dining room, drawing room, study room, servant's room and other habitable rooms. Kitchen, bathroom, latrine, store room, passageway and verandah which are not normally usable for living are not considered as dwelling rooms. A room, used for multipurpose such as sleeping, sitting, dining, storing, cooking, etc., is regarded as a dwelling room. In a situation where a census house is used as a shop or office., etc., and the household also stays in it then the room is not considered as a dwelling room. But if a garage or servant quarter is used by a servant and if she/ he also lives in it as a separate household then this has been considered as a dwelling room

available to the servant's household. Tent or conical shaped hut if used for living by any household is also considered as dwelling room.

A dwelling room, which is shared by more than one household, has not been counted for any of them. If two households have a dwelling room each but in addition also share a common dwelling room, then the common room has not been counted for either of the households.

#### **Census House:**

A 'census house' is a building or part of a building used or recognised as a separate unit because of having a separate main entrance from the road or common courtyard or staircase, etc. It may be occupied or vacant. It may be used for residential or non-residential purpose or both.

In certain peculiar situations, the manner in which buildings and census houses were identified for numbering in the field by the enumerators is described hereunder:

Sometimes a series of different buildings are found along a street which are joined with one another by common walls on either side looking like a continuous structure. These different units are practically independent of one another and are likely to have been built at different times and owned by different persons. In such cases, though the whole structure with all the adjoining units apparently appears to be one building, each portion was treated as a separate building and its constituent units as separate census houses.

On the other hand, one may come across cases, particularly in large cities of multi-storeyed ownership flats. In these cases while the structure looks like one building, different persons own the flats. In case of such multi-storeyed structures, having a number of flats owned by different persons, the entire structure was treated as one building and each flat as a separate census house.

If within a large enclosed area, there are separate buildings owned by different persons then each such building is treated as a separate building. There can be a situation where within an enclosed compound there are separate buildings owned by an undertaking or company or even government that are actually in occupation of different persons. For example, Indian Oil Corporation colony where the buildings are owned by the Corporation but these are in occupation of their employees. Each such building was treated as a separate building. But if in any one of these buildings there were flats in occupation of different households, each such flat was reckoned as a separate census house.

Sometimes it becomes difficult to apply the definition of census house strictly in certain cases. For example, in an urban area, if a flat has five rooms, each room having direct entrance from the common staircase or courtyard. By definition, this has to be treated as five census houses. If all these five rooms are occupied by a single household it was not realistic to treat them as five census houses. In such a case, 'singleness' of use of these rooms along with the main house should be considered and the entire flat was treated as one census house. On the other hand, if two independent households occupy these five rooms, the first household living in 3 rooms and the second household occupying 2 rooms, then considering the use, the first three rooms together were treated as one census house and the remaining rooms as another census house. But if each room was occupied by an independent household, then each such room was treated as a separate census house.

In case of hostels, hotels, etc., even if the door of each room in which an inmate lives opens to a common verandah, staircase, courtyard or a common room, as it happens almost invariably, the entire hostel/ hotel building was treated as one census house. but if such hostels/ hotels have out-houses or other structures used for different purposes or the same purpose, then each such structure attached to the main hostel/hotel was treated as a separate census house.

In some parts of the country, in rural areas, the pattern of habitation is such that a group of huts, located in a compound, whether enclosed or unenclosed, is occupied by one household. While the main residence may be located in one hut, other huts may be used for sleeping, as a kitchen, bath room, baithak, etc. Though each of the huts was a separates structure, they form a single housing unit and therefore, have to be treated collectively as one building and one census house. If some of the huts are used by one household and the others by a second household as residence, then the two groups of huts were treated as separate census

houses. However, if there were also other huts in the compound used for other purposes and not as part of the household's residence such as, cattle shed, workshed, etc., these were treated as separate census houses.

On the other hand, in urban areas, where more than one structure within an enclosed or open compound (premises) belonging to the same person, e.g., the main house, the servant's quarter, the garage, etc., only one building number was given for this group and each of the constituent a separate census house number.

Only cases where a structure with roof and pillars has come up was treated as a building.

## Village:

The basic unit for rural areas is the revenue village, which has definite surveyed boundaries. The revenue village may comprise of one or more hamlets but the entire village is treated as one unit for presentation of data. In unsurveyed areas, like villages within forest areas, each habitation area with locally recognized boundaries is treated as one village.

#### Rural-Urban area:

The data in tables on Houses, Household Amenities and Assets are presented separately for rural and urban areas. The unit of classification in this regard is 'town' for urban areas and 'village' for rural areas. In the Census of India 2001, the definition of urban area adopted is as follows:

- a) All places with a municipality, corporation, cantonment board or notified town area committee, etc.
- b) A place satisfying the following three criteria simultaneously:
  - i) A minimum population of 5,000;
  - ii) at least 75 per cent of male working population engaged in non-agricultural pursuits; and
  - iii) a density of population of at least 400 per sq. km.(1,000 per sq. mile)

For identification of places which would qualify to be classified as 'urban' all villages, which, as per the 1991 Census had a population of 4,000 and above, a population density of 400 persons per sq. km. and having at least 75 per cent of male working population engaged in non-agricultural activity were considered. To work out the proportion of male working population referred to above against b) (ii), the data relating to main workers were taken into account.

Apart from these, the outgrowths (OGs) of cities and towns have also been treated as urban under 'Urban Agglomerations'. Examples of out-growths are railway colonies, university campuses, port areas, military camps, etc., that may have come up near a statutory town or city but within the revenue limits of a village or villages contiguous to the town or city. Each such individual area by itself may not satisfy the demographic criteria laid down at (b) above to qualify it to be treated as an independent urban unit but may deserve to be clubbed with the towns as a continuous urban spread. Thus, the town level data, wherever presented, also includes the data for outgrowths of such towns.

## City:

Towns with population of 100,000 and above are called cities.

#### **Urban Agglomeration:**

An Urban Agglomeration is a continuous urban spread constituting a town and its adjoining urban outgrowths (OGs) or two or more physically contiguous towns together and any adjoining urban outgrowths of such towns. In some cases, railway colonies, university campuses, port areas, etc., may come up near a city or statutory town outside its statutory limits but within the revenue limits of a village or villages contiguous to the town or city. Each such individual area by itself may not satisfy the minimum population limit to qualify it to be treated as an independent urban unit but may deserve to be clubbed with the town as a continuous urban spread.

For the purpose of delineation of Urban Agglomerations during Census of India 2001, following criteria are taken as pre-requisites:

- (a) The core town or at least one of the constituent towns of an urban agglomeration should necessarily be a statutory town; and
- (b) The total population of all the constituents (i.e., towns and outgrowths) of an Urban Agglomeration should not be less than 20,000 (as per the 1991 Census).

With these two basic criteria having been met, the following are the possible different situations in which Urban Agglomerations would be constituted:

- a city or town with one or more contiguous outgrowths;
- ii) two or more adjoining towns with their outgrowths; and
- iii) a city and one or more adjoining towns with their outgrowths all of which form a continuous spread.

## Household:

A 'household' is usually a group of persons who normally live together and take their meals from a common kitchen unless the exigencies of work prevent any of them from doing so. Persons in a household may be related or unrelated or a mix of both. However, if a group of unrelated persons live in a census house but do not take their meals from the common kitchen, then they are not constituent of a common household. Each such person was to be treated as a separate household. The important link in finding out whether it was a household or not was a common kitchen. There may be one member households, two member households or multi-member households.

#### **Institutional Household:**

A group of unrelated persons who live in an institution and take their meals from a common kitchen is called an Institutional Household. Examples of Institutional Households are boarding houses, messes, hostels, hotels, rescue homes, jails, ashrams, orphanages, etc. To make the definition more clearly perceptible to the enumerators at the Census 2001, it was specifically mentioned that this category or households would cover only those households where a group of unrelated persons live in an institution and share a common kitchen.

#### **Houseless household:**

Households who do not live in buildings or census houses but live in the open on roadside, pavements, in hume pipes, under flyovers and staircases, or in the open in places of worship, mandaps, railway platforms, etc., are treated as Houseless Households.

#### **Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes:**

Article 341 of the Constitution provides that the President may, with respect to any State or Union

territory, specify the castes, races or tribes or parts of or groups within castes, races or tribes which shall for the purposes of the Constitution be deemed to be Scheduled Castes in relation to that State or Union territory. Article 342 similarly provides for specification of tribes or tribal communities or parts of or groups within tribes or tribal communities which are to be deemed for the purposes of the Constitution to be Scheduled Tribes in relation to the various States and Union territories. In pursuance of these provisions, the list of Scheduled Castes and/or Scheduled Tribes are notified for each State and Union territory and are valid only within the jurisdiction of that State or Union territory and not outside.

It is important to mention here that under the Constitution (Scheduled Castes) Order, 1950, no person who professed a religion different from Hinduism was deemed to be a member of a Scheduled Castes in addition to every member of the Ramdasi, Kabirpanthi, Majhabi or Sikligar Castes resident in Punjab or Patiala and East Punjab States Union were in relation to that State whether they professed the Hindu or the Sikh religion. Subsequently, in September 1956, by an amendment, the Presidential Order of 1950 and in all subsequent Presidential Orders relating to Scheduled Castes, the Hindu and the Sikh religions were placed on the same footing with regard to the specification of Scheduled Castes. Later on, as per the amendment made in the Constitution (Scheduled Castes) Order 1990, the Hindu, the Sikh and the Buddhist were placed on the same footing with regard to the recognition of the Scheduled Castes.

## Language and Mother tongue:

As per the census concept, each language is a group of mother tongues. The census questionnaire collects information on the mother tongue of each person and mother tongue is defined as the language spoken in childhood by the person's mother to the person. If the mother died in infancy, the language mainly spoken in the person's home in childhood will be the mother tongue. In the case of infants and deaf mutes, the language usually spoken by the mother is considered as mother tongue. It is not necessary that the language spoken as mother tongue should have a script. The mother tongues returned by the respondents in census are classified and grouped under appropriate languages according to their linguistic characteristics.

#### Literate:

A person aged 7 years and above who can both read and write with understanding in any language is taken as literate. A person who can only read but cannot write is not literate. It is not necessary that to be considered as literate, a person should have received any formal education or passed any minimum educational standard. Literacy could also have been achieved through adult literacy classes or through any non-formal educational system. People who are blind and can read in Braille are treated as literates.

#### Literacy rate:

Literacy rate of the population is defined as the percentage of literates in the age-group seven years and above. For different age-groups the percentage of literates in that age-group gives the literacy rate.

#### **Educational level:**

The highest level of education a person has completed.

#### Work:

Work is defined as participation in any economically productive activity with or without compensation, wages or profit. Such participation may be physical and/or mental in nature. Work involves not only actual work but also includes effective supervision and direction of work. It even includes part time help or unpaid work on farm, family enterprise or in any other economic activity. All persons engaged in 'work' as defined above are workers. Persons who are engaged in cultivation or milk production even solely for domestic consumption are also treated as workers.

Reference period for determining a person as worker and non-worker is one year preceding the date of enumeration.

#### Main worker:

A person who has worked for major part of the reference period (i.e. six months or more during the last one year preceding the date of enumeration) in any economically productive activity is termed as 'Main worker'.

## Marginal worker:

A person who worked for less than six months of the reference period (i.e. in the last one year preceding the date of enumeration) in any economic activity is termed as 'Marginal worker'.

#### Non-worker:

A person who has not worked at all in any economically productive activity during the reference period (i.e. last one year preceding the date of enumeration) is termed as 'Non worker'.

#### **Cultivator:**

For purposes of the Census, a person is classified as cultivator if he or she is engaged in cultivation on land owned or held from government or held from private persons or institutions for payment in money, kind or share. Cultivation includes effective supervision or direction in cultivation.

A person, who has given out her/his land to another person or persons or institution(s) for cultivation for money, kind or share of crop and who does not even supervise or direct cultivation in exchange of land, is not treated as cultivator. Similarly, a person working on another person's land for wages in cash or kind or a combination of both (agricultural labourers) is not treated as cultivator.

Cultivation involves ploughing, sowing, harvesting and production of cereals and millet crops such as wheat, paddy, jowar, bajra, ragi, etc., and other crops such as sugarcane, tobacco, ground-nuts, tapioca, etc., and pulses, raw jute and kindred fiber crop, cotton, cinchona and other medicinal plants, fruit growing, vegetable growing or keeping orchards or groves, etc. Cultivation does not include the following plantation crops – tea, coffee, rubber, coconut and betel nuts (areca).

## Agricultural labourer:

A person who works on another person's land for wages in money or kind or share is regarded as an agricultural labourer. She/he has no risk in the cultivation, but merely works on another person's land for wages. An agricultural labourer has no right of lease or contract on land on which she/he works.

## Household industry worker:

Household industry is defined as an industry conducted by the head of the household herself/himself and or by the members of the household at home or within the village in rural areas and only within the precincts of the house where the household lives in urban areas. The larger proportion of workers in household industry should consist of members of the household including the head. The industry should not be run on the scale of a registered factory which would qualify or has to be registered under the Indian Factories Act and should be engaged in manufacturing, processing, servicing and repairs of goods.

It does not include professions such as a pleader, Doctor, Musician, Dancer, Waterman, Astrologer, Dhobi, Barber, etc. or merely trade or business, even if such professions, trade or services are run at home by members of the household.

#### Other worker:

A person, who has been engaged in some economic activity during the reference period but not as a cultivator or agricultural labourer or in Household Industry, is termed as a 'Other Worker (OW)'. The type of workers that come under this category of 'OW' include all government servants, municipal employees, teachers, factory workers, plantation workers, those engaged in trade, commerce, business, transport, banking, mining, construction, political or social work, priests, entertainment artists, etc. In effect, all those workers other than cultivators or agricultural labourers or household industry workers, are 'Other Workers'.

## Work participation rate:

Percentage of workers (main + marginal) to total population.

## **Population density:**

Population density is the number of persons inhabited per square kilometer of the area.

## Age:

Age is measured in terms of the completed number of years.

#### Sex Ratio:

Number of females per 1,000 males in a population.

## (vi) Non-Census Concepts

## Improved drinking water:

If the household had access to drinking water supplied from a tap, hand pump, tube well or well (protected or covered) situated within or outside the premises, it is considered as having access to improved drinking water.

It may be mentioned that such uniform definition may not be valid across all States.

## **System of sewerage:**

Generally, a sewerage system would mean a network of mains and branches of underground conduits for the conveyance of sewerage to the point of disposal. Sewers that carry only household and industrial wastage are called separate sewers; those that carry storm water from roofs, streets and other surfaces are known as storm water drains, while those carrying both sewage and storm water are called combined sewers. However, in some towns, which are not provided with such underground sewerage system, it is served by open surface drain, box drain, silk pattern drain, etc., in these towns.

# Type of latrine and Method of disposal of night soil.

There are three prevalent systems of disposal of human wastes, viz. :

- (i) underground sewerage,
- (ii) sanitary water flush latrines with individual disposal systems, like septic tank, leaching cess pool and collecting well, and
- (iii) dry type of latrines with manual scavenging.

The system of underground sewerage provides for the street sewerage with which are connected the sanitary latrines constructed in the houses having water closets and fitted with flushing cistern (or hand flushing). Through this sewer the fecal matter is transported without the need for scavenging. This system generally exists in cities and big towns.

Where the street sewer does not exist, these sanitary water flush latrines are connected to a local septic tank with a sub-soil dispersion system or a leaching pit. Here the liquid wastes from the water closet is disposed of locally in leaching pit, a septic

tank with a soil dispersion system is constructed. This dispersion requires an optimum travel through the pores of the soil, which renders the harmful liquid bacterially innocuous by the slow process of filtration through the soil traversed.

Where the soil is impermeable, collecting wells are constructed and the sanitary water flush latrines are connected with them. These wells are cleaned at periodic intervals by a suitable device. The dry type of latrines are of service type latrines from where human excreta is removed by scavengers from house to house, in most cases carrying it on their heads or shoulders or in baskets with handle or wheel barrows. These are then collected in bullock carts or trucks or tractors and trolleys for being carried to the dumping grounds.

## Fertility:

In demography, the word fertility is used in relation to the actual production of children or occurrence of births specially live births. Fertility is a measure of rate at which population adds to itself by births and normally assessed by relating the number of births to a full or part of the population, such as number of married women or number of women of child-bearing age. The definitions of the terminology used in computing different fertility rates are mentioned below:

## Crude birth rate (CBR):

Ratio of the number of live births in a year to the mid year population, normally expressed per 1,000 population.

## Crude death rate (CDR):

#### Civic status of urban units:

Civic Status of a town/city is determined on the basis of Civic Administrative authority of the town e.g., Municipal Corporation/Corporation, Municipal Committee/Municipal council, Municipality etc.

#### Size class of U.A./town:

Size-class of U.A./Town is based on the population size of the U.A./City/Town U.A.s/Towns with 100,000 and above population are classified as Class I U.A.s/Towns. These Class I U.A.s./Towns are now further sub classified into seven sub classes namely M1 to M7 depending on the population size of U.A./City/Town. These are:

M7 (5,000,000 and above); M6 (2,000,000 to 4,999,999); M5 (1,000,000-1,999,999);

M4 (500,000-999,999); M3 (300,000-499,999); M2 (200,000-299,999); and M1 (100,000-199,999).

Towns with 50,000 to 99,999 population are classified as Class II towns, 20,000 to 49,999 population are Class III towns, population with 10,000-19,999 are Class IV towns, population with 5,000 and 9,999 are Class V towns and towns with less than 5,000 population are Class VI towns.

## Slum area:

The Slum Areas (Improvement and Clearance) Act, 1956, which was enacted by the Central Government defined slums as a) Areas where buildings are in any respect unfit for human habitation; or b) are by reasons of dilapidation, overcrowding, fault arrangement and design of such buildings, narrowness or faulty arrangement of streets, lack of ventilation, light or sanitation facilities, or any combination of these factors, are detrimental to safety, health or morals.

## Mega city:

The concept of 'Mega city' is a recent phenomenon in the Urban Sociology and is defined in term of metropolitan city in the form of large size, problem of management of civic amenities and capacity to absorb the relatively high growth of population. Indian Census in 1991 treated the population size of 5 million and above as the cut off point to identify a place as the mega city. Whereas, for the purpose of inclusion in Centrally Sponsored Scheme for Infrastructure Development in Mega cities the Ministry of Urban Affairs and employment, Department of Urban Development adopted the criteria of 4 million and above population as per 1991 Census for Mega Cities. In 2001 Census, cities with 10 millions and above population have been treated as Mega cities.

## (vii) Census 2001 findings

Census taking is a massive operation carried out in a short span of time with the active participation of a veritable army of enumerators. The reference moment for the 2001 Census is the midnight of 28<sup>th</sup> Feb. 2001 i.e. the census provides a snapshot of the population of the country, as it existed at the midnight

of 28<sup>th</sup> Feb.2001. Actual enumeration was spread over a period of 20 days from 9<sup>th</sup> Feb. 2001 to 28<sup>th</sup> Feb. 2001 followed by revisional round up to 5<sup>th</sup> march 2001 for up dating of the population figures with reference to the midnight of 28<sup>th</sup> Feb 2001. Household schedule was canvassed by the enumerator and with a view to ensuring uniformity in approach in understanding the various concepts and in proper eliciting and recording of the information, the enumerators and supervisors were imparted both theoretical as well as practical training intensively in 3 rounds.

As a prelude to the actual census the urban and rural areas were identified and listed out in respect of each administrative unit. The Director of census operations had prepared the list of urban areas and simultaneously, a list of villages. These lists formed the basic frame for the organization of the census operations. There after, geographical areas that could be conveniently covered by each enumerator were carefully carved out to constitute the enumerator's block.

The second major step was the house listing operation, which was carried out in this Union Territory during April 2000. Thereafter, in order to adhere to the prescribed workload norms the actual census enumerator's blocks were carefully demarcated on the basis of the house list population and the layout sketches and notional maps prepares for the houselisting operation. Houselisting operation was also utilized to collect wealth of information on items such as predominant material for construction of houses, amenities available to the census households, number of living rooms etc.

# Distribution of population in Rural and Urban areas :

The total population of Chandigarh distt. as per 2001 census is 900,635 with 506,938 males and 393,697 females. It is a uni-district and uni-tahsil territory.

Out of the total population of the district 808,515 persons (90%) are residing in urban areas while the remaining 92,120 persons (10%) are living in rural areas. The proportion of urban population to total population regarded as an index of urbanization is 90 percent for Chandigarh district.

Chandigarh distt. has 24 villages of which 23 villages are inhabited while one village i.e. as Chahar –Tarf–Burail is uninhabited.

The urban population resides in only one Town

i.e. Chandigarh which is under the jurisdiction of Municipal Corporation, Chandigarh. The break up of population among rural and urban areas for males and females separately is given in the table given below:

## Size, Class and status of Towns:

Sometimes during census the status and number of towns, Census Towns or municipal councils etc change either due to addition of new Census Towns or declassification of old Census Towns. During 1991 Census there were 3 Census Towns namely Burail

(CT), Attawa (CT) and Manimajra Rural (CT). As per 2001 Census there is only one Town i.e. Chandigarh, which is administratered by Chandigarh Municipal Corporation and is divided into 20 wards. Each ward has a representative in the municipal corporation who is responsible for the development of his/her own ward area.

The above table gives the distribution of villages by population size and their percentage to total inhabited villages in the district.

Chandigarh Union Territory has a total 24 villages out of which 23 villages are inhabited while 1 village i.e. Chahar-Tarf-Burail is uninhabited. When we see these villages according to population ranges. We see that 6 villages or 26.1 percent villages have a population of more than 5,000 but less than 10,000. 7 villages or 30.4 percent villages have a population of more than 2,000 but less than 5,000 and 3 villages or 13.0 percent villages have a population of less than 200 while 4 villages or 17.4 percent villages have a

population of more than 500 but less than 2,000 and 2 villages or 8.7 percent villages have a population more than 10,000.

## Population Growth, Density and Sex Ratio:

**Population Growth:** The population of the district as per 1991 census was 642,015, which has gone to 900,635 persons in 2001 adding 258,620 persons during 1991-2001. The growth rate of population during 1991-2001 comes to 40.3 percent. The population growth in rural areas comes to 39.2 percent while the urban population has increased by 40.4 percent.

The above table gives decadal change in distribution of population and percentage of urban population to total population for the district in 1991 and 2001 census.

The population of the district has increased by 40.3 percent adding 258,620 persons during the decade 1991-2001. The district urban population has also increased by 40.4 percent slightly higher than the total population growth whereas this growth for rural area has been recorded as 39.2 percent.

**Density:** The overall density of population of Chandigarh district comes to 7,900 persons per square kilometer as compared to 1991 density of 3,632 persons per square kilometer.

**Sex Ratio:** The sex ratio in the Chandigarh U.T. has been recorded as 777 females per 1,000 males. The rural sex ratio has been recorded as 790 where as for urban areas is 796 females per 1,000 males.

## **Literacy**:

A person who can both read and write with understanding in any language has been taken as literate. A person who can merely read but cannot write is not literate. It is not necessary that a person who is literate should have received any formal education or should have passed any minimum educational standard. Like 1991 Census all children of age 6 years or less are treated as illiterates although they may be going to school and can read and write a few odd words. During 1981 Census this limit was upto the age of 4 years. It had also been decided in the 1991 Census to use only effective literacy rates i.e. the ratio of literates and population excluding the age group of 0-6.

The table D shows that the literacy rate for males is higher than females. The male literacy stood at

86.1 percent as compared to 76.5 percent for females. The rural and urban break up shows that the urban literacy is higher than rural. The urban literacy stood at 82.6 percent as compared to 75.6 percent for rural.

## Work participation rate:

The work participation rate for total workers is defined as the percentage of total workers to total population. In a similar way it is defined for main and marginal workers. The 2001 Census recorded 37.8 percent as the total workers, 36.5 percent as main workers and 1.3 percent as marginal workers. The corresponding figures for the 1991 Census were 41.5 percent for total workers, 41.4 percent for main workers and 0.2 percent for marginal workers. These figures for the C.D. block stood at 41.4 percent for main workers and 2.2 percent for marginal workers.

The proportion of total workers, main workers and marginal workers is higher in respect of males than females. Whereas the proportion of non-workers is more in females than in males.

#### **Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes:**

For discharging the constitutional obligation by the Government towards the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes, one of the basic requirements is the availability of population details for each notified Castes and Tribes. To meet this requirement, the office of the Registrar General, and Census Commissioner, India has been providing such details since the 1951 Census. The necessary data about the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes are provided for evolving suitable plans for their socio-economic upliftment and both the planners and administrators heavily depend on this data. The data are collected on the aspects of age, sex, marital status, economy, education, fertility etc. for Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in addition to these aspects also on language and religion.

In pursuance of the article 341 of the Constitution of India, the President of India has notified some castes, races or tribes or parts of or groups within castes, races or tribes as Scheduled Castes. Similarly Scheduled Tribes mean all such tribes or tribal communities or parts of or groups within such tribes or tribal communities as are declared by the President of India, to be treated as Scheduled Tribes under article 342 of the Constitution of India. There is a slight change

in the definition of Scheduled Castes in 1990. Before that Scheduled Castes could belong to Hindu or Sikh religion, but from 1990 Scheduled Castes may belong to Buddhist religion also. The list of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes are notified for each State and Union Territory and are valid only within the jurisdiction of that State or Union Territory and not outside.

The above table reveals that Scheduled Castes Population in Chandigarh Union Territory is 17.5 percent in 2001, which was 16.5 percent of the total population in 1991 as compared to 14.1 percent in 1981. The Scheduled Castes Population has shown a decennial growth rate of +48.7 during 1991-2001. The decennial growth rate of Rural and Urban has been +4.2 and +55.6 in 2001 census which was 107.5 and 61.7 during 1991 census respectively.

The sex ratio among Scheduled Castes population in Chandigarh has been 810 against 922 in India during 1991. However, the sex ratio of 810 among Scheduled Castes has been higher as compared to sex ratio of 790 for general in 1991

in Chandigarh. The sex ratio among Scheduled Castes has increased in urban areas from 760 in 1981 to 820 in 1991 in Chandigarh whereas in rural areas it has declined from 783 in 1981 to 748 in 1991.

The percentage of workers among Scheduled Castes Population (39.3 percent) is more pronounced in India than in Chandigarh U.T. at 32.3 percent. The percentage of male workers stands at 51.5 percent, which is almost at par with the corresponding figure of 50.8 percent in Chandigarh. The percentage of female workers is far less (9.5 percent) in comparison to all India percentage of 26.0 percent. The percentage of female non-workers is quite high (90.5 percent) in Chandigarh as against the all India percentage of 74.0 percent.

There is no urban agglomeration in Chandigarh. Therefore, the data presented in the corresponding tables relates to the only town of Chandigarh for census 2001.











NUMBER OF LITERATES AND ILLITERATES BY SEX IN C.D. BLOCKS, 2001







NUMBER OF SCHEDULED CASTES LITERATES AND ILLITERATES BY SEX IN C.D. BLOCKS, 2001



DISTRIBUTION OF VILLAGES BY LITERACY RATE RANGE FOR SCHEDULED CASTES POPULATION, 2001







NUMBER OF MAIN WORKERS, MARGINAL WORKERS, AND NON-WORKERS BY SEX IN TAHSILS, 2001









needles and semi conductor devices while it is known for the manufacture of industrial fasteners, tractor parts and steel structural fabrication.

This table shows that most of the households have owned (92,298) and rented (86,683) dwelling units in Chandigarh. Most of the Scheduled Castes households have owned (20,035) and 'Others' (9,420) dwelling units. In rural areas most of the Total and Scheduled Castes households have rented dwelling units. While in urban area most of the Total and Scheduled Castes households have owned dwelling units.

The Total households that have owned dwelling units on an average occupy two rooms in comparison to an average of one room occupied by Scheduled Castes households. The households with 'Others' dwelling units occupy an average of one room irrespective of caste. Similarly there are households in each category of tenure status that have no exclusive room.

percent households live in temporary houses in urban areas and 10.4 percent, 13.2 percent and 8.5 percent of households live in permanent, semi-permanent and temporary houses respectively in rural areas.

The above table shows the number of Households availing banking services and having specified assets. Banking services are availed by about half of the rural and more than half of the urban households. It can be seen from the above table that television and bicycle are commonly possessed by the rural and urban households. Cars, Jeeps, Vans, Scooters, motor cycle and moped are common in urban households than the rural households.

# (xi) Major Social and Cultural events in the District Fairs and festivals of Chandigarh :

**Festival of Garden:** 'Festival of Garden' is an annual event of Chandigarh. It is celebrated in the month of February/March every year as a three-day

festival at famous Zakir Rose Garden, Sector 16, Chandigarh. The festival has specialised activities related to horticulture and environmental landscaping besides fun and frolic, cultural programmes, Amusement Park, eatable and non-eatable shopping. The three-day festivity bonanza evokes a tremendous response from the tourists and visitors, both Indian and International and also from the residents of Chandigarh and adjoining States.

**Chandigarh Carnival:** A mega tourism event, popularly known as Chandigarh Carnival is celebrated in the month of November/December every year. The freedom of thought and creative expression is absolute and there is full recognition and encouragement for

the original and imaginative. Tableaux mounted on tractors/trolleys and other vehicles depicting composite culture of the City forms another attraction. A theme village is erected containing fun and frolic, theme base food festival, cultural bonanza and other items of festivities besides various contests and competitions. The Chandigarh Carnival has not only become a source of pure delight for the residents of the City as well as the tourists, taking away the stresses of life, monotonies, but also serves to encourage a sense of creativity amongst people.

Mango Festival: The popularity of Mango is second to none. In order to welcome the advent of mango season and to encourage the growers of the fruit from all over Northern India and to create the awareness among the public regarding availability of various varieties of mangoes. The Mango festival is held in the month of June. The festival evolves the displaying of different types of mangoes, a food festival, cultural programme and other fun and frolic.

**Teej Festival:** Teej, exclusively, a festival of women is very popular in this part of the Country and is celebrated in the month of August. It is celebrated with gusto, sway of swings, accompanied by singing of folk songs, group dances and other items of festivity and joy.

World Tourism Day: World Tourism Day is celebrated each year on 27th September. On this day, a variety of programmes are organised to facilitate the tourists/visitors and residents of Chandigarh and around. The programmes so arranged include special sight seeing tours, discounts, concessions and attractions to the tourists by various private and government run hotels and restaurants, special cultural programmes, tourism meets and seminars, besides other tourism related activities including illumination of tourism buildings.

Chrysanthemum Show: Chandigarh is also called the City of Gardens. It boasts of having a number of well built and well maintained gardens in the specialised Terrace Garden. Every year in the month of December, a flower show is held where large number of varieties of Chrysanthemums are displayed. The visitors are encouraged to get saplings/seeds to grow Chrysanthemum flowers at their houses. Specialists answer the queries of flower lovers from Chandigarh and

adjoining areas. Since, at this time, the transit tourists pass through Chandigarh, the Chandigarh Tourism organises a cultural evening as a part of Chrysanthemum Show celebrations.

# (xii) Brief description of places of religious, historical or archaeological importance and places of tourist interest in the district

Le Corbusier's Chandigarh, situated at the foothills of Siwalik Hills is proud itself for being the most modern and well planned Cities of India. Known for its scenic surroundings and modern architecture, the City offers excellent avenues for outings and enjoyment. Quiet and peaceful, the City Beautiful is engulfed in green environs. A clean City with open and wide roads, abundance of parks and exhilarating fresh air and so many enticing tourist places to see as under:

Capitol Complex (Sector 1): Capitol Complex is the most spectacular work of modern architecture. It comprises three epoch making architectural masterpieces; the Secretariate, the High Court and the Legislative Assembly. The manificient edifices, set against the Siwalik peaks, stands as massive concrete sculputre, representing the monumental character and authority that the complex represents.

Rock Garden (Sector 1): The world famous fantasy, called the Rock Garden created by Nek Chand, has become almost a heritage site. A trip to the Rock Garden reveals how urban and industrial waste can be fruitfully recycled and used in creative pursuits. Visitors leave in admiration, only to return again.

**Sukhna Lake (Sector 5):** Sukhna, a manmade lake attracts migratory birds from far off regions and countries. It is an idyllic place for quiet communion with Nature and offers water sports activities such as boating, yachting, water skiing etc. The lake has the longest channel for rowing and yachting events in Asia.

**Rose Garden (Sector 16):** Rose Garden with over 1,600 rose varieties is the largest in Asia and is spread over an area of 27 acres. This garden is the venue of the annual Festival of Gardens and even listed on the national Calendar of fairs and festivals and is held in February/March every year.

Museum of the Evolution of life (Sector 10): Opened on August 14, 1973. A large Cyclorama gallery is the focus of the museum, it depicts the origin of the earth and the evolution of life. Other galleries introduce the viewer to astronomy, geology and the world of ancient man.

International Doll Museum (Sector 23): Set up on December 24, 1985 in Bal Bhawan, it contains more than 300 dolls from nearly every Country in the world. Ten ceramic murals and large model train completes the display.

**Leisure Valley (Sector 10):** Leisure Valley runs through the entire length of the City, 8 kms long and about 400 metres broad at its widest points, oriented northeast to southwest following the course of an existing seasonal stream.

**Shanti Kunj (Sector 16):** The name means, "Abode of Peace", trees, pools and streams crossed by curved bridges and a large number of meditation nooks define this garden. There is also an open air stage.

Terraced Garden (Sector 33): A small valley running through out the length of the Sector has been developed into a terraced flower garden and a garden for walkers with an illuminated musical Fountain. The garden is the venue for the Chrysanthemum show.

**Open Hand (Sector 1):** This is the most important monument conceived by Le Corbusier and is located near the High Court building. Corbusier defined the open hand as "Open to receive and open to give".

National Gallery of Portraits (Sector 17): Portraits of Indian freedom fighters, rare documents and recordings of the voices of leaders such as Mahatma Gandhi and Jawaharlal Nehru are exhibited and preserved.

City Museum (Sector 10): The creation of the City Museum is one of the several activities pursued by the Chandigarh Administration during the fiftieth anniversary of India's Independence. The objective was to document and display the sequential planning that went into this unique urban experiment, and to bring out the distinctive and significant aspects of its layout and design.

Punjab University (Sector 14): An affiliating and teaching University, the Punjab University was incorporated in 1882 at Lahore. The assets and staff of this half century old institution were divided in 1947. Those opting for India initially migrated to Shimla and shifted in 1956 to the campus of Chandigarh. The basic layout of the building was designed by Perry Jeanneret. The Gandhi Bhawan is poised atop a large reflecting Pool. The campus is worth visiting to see.

**Botanical Garden (Sector 1):** Between the Rock Garden and Sukhna Lake, the Botanical garden is spread over 88 acres. Its rookeries, Lilly-pools and the rare species covered in green houses draw garden lovers as well as botanists.

**Topiary Park (Sector 35):** Wire frames and the deft use of pruning shears has transformed creepers and bushes into animal and bird figures.

**Rajendra Park** (Sector 1): It is a vast stretch of land of about 400 acres, abutting the Secretariat building on its eastern side in Sector 1. Le-Corbusier himself designed the landscaping of this park.

Garden of Fragrance (Sector 36): The garden of fragrance is very popular for different varieties of aromatic and fragrance plants. Flowering plants like, Raat-Ki-Rani, Motia, Varieties of Chameli, Damask Rose, Mehndi, Champa, Harsingar, etc have been planted.

The gardens are the best attraction for visitors during the months of February-March every year.

### Places of religious importance:

Chandigarh has a religious nomenclature. The City was named after "Chandi" – the Goddess of Bravery. It is estimated that various villages spread over the present site of Chandigarh had 28 places of worship. There are many temples of Hindus and Jains, many gurdwaras, churches and masjids/dargahas scattered in different parts of the City.

**Temples:** Most of the temples are concentrated in the older sectors spread between Madhya Marg and Dakshin Marg. Three Jain temples are located in Sectors 18, 27 and 28.

**Gurdwaras:** Gurdwaras are uniformly distributed in the City. Gurudwaras located in Sector 8 and 34 are connected with the visit of Guru Gobind Singh and Guru Teg Bahadur respectively. In some cases, Gurudwaras and Temples are in close proximity to each other.

**Churches :** Churches are widely scattered. A protestant church located in Sector 18 is the oldest Chruch and has wide following.

**Masjids/Dergahas:** These are sporadically distributed over the City. The Sector 20 is the most important one for the city's muslim population.

There is a conspicuous absence of any place of worship in the elite class sectors 1 to 6.

#### (xiii) Major Characteristics of the District

Chandigarh Union Territory being a place of modern architecture is enjoying all kinds of facilities. A brief description of various activities are given as under:

#### **Economic resources:**

#### i) Electricity and Power:

Electricity plays an important role in industry as well as agriculture. Chandigarh has a good electric network with cent percent electrification. The electricity consumption in Chandigarh Union Territory is 715,019,449 KWH for the year 1998-99. The electricity consumption for industry is 179,234,315 KWH whereas consumption of electricity for agriculture is 2,558,205 KWH.

#### ii) Industries:

Chandigarh is unique in India in the matter of industrial growth. Its industrial area is segregated from the living area by a green belt. Perhaps the only other city in the world, which follows the concept of segregating the living quarters from the factory area, is Frankfurt in West Germany where a running river separates factories from habitations.

Chandigarh has a clear skyline with no smoke seen going up the chimneys except from a solitary oil mill in the northeast corner of the Industrial Area. Absence of smoke spells absence of pollution; a unique achievement for a city in this era of growing industrialisation. People living in comparable big cities like Ludhiana and Delhi feel the difference at once on landing at Chandigarh. This subjective test apart, there is the objective testimony of hospitals, dispensaries and medical practitioners about the number of patients of asthma and bronchitus created by them. Chandigarh has the lowest percentage of such patients. And those that suffer from these diseases here derive their ailments and aggravation from pollens and not dust or smoke as the case in most other cities.

From the very start the Administration of this planned city has adopted a policy of not allowing industries, which emit smoke or foul smell, spread pollution or create ecological imbalance. This policy laid down by Le-Corbusier had the blessings of Jawahar Lal Nehru, with the creation of Departments of Environment in most States under the directive of Prime Minister Indira Gandhi in 1982 the Union Territory Administration has been laying more stress on pollution free industries.

Industry plays an important role in the development of a Country. There are certain areas, which have an easy access to raw material. Chandigarh being not attached with the industrial towns like Ludhiana is not so advanced in the field of industry. Beginning of Industries in Chandigarh has been made by erstwhile Punjab Government by setting up an industrial area of 774 acres of land. In the first instance about 205 plots were developed and allotted to the industrialists. On the reorganisation of Punjab State in November 1966 Chandigarh City along with its adjoining villages were given the status of Union Territory. To boost industrial development after the constitution of Chandigarh Union Territory, the Chandigarh Administration took immediate steps to carve out new plots to meet the growing demand of entrepreneurs. There were 2108 small-scale units during 1986 and 13,819 persons were engaged in these small-scale units. The number of small-scale units rose to 2310 during 1987, the number of workers to 18,535. The number of workers again moved to 21,032 during the year 1988-89. The number of workers again moved to 18,190 during the year 1998-99. The following table shows the number of registered factories in Chandigarh Union Territory under the Factories Act, 1948 as in next table:

Le-Corbusier had conceived of Chandigarh as an outstretched human body. The Capitol Complex was to be its head, with the City Centre serving as its heart. The University was to constitute one arm of this body and the Industrial area the other.

Since Chandigarh of his dreams was to be a much smaller city than it is today. The industrial area second phase is not as per his plans. He would not have permitted industries near the living quarters in sector 30 or would have provided a green belt-cum-mango grove in the industrial area second phase.

#### iii) Transport and Communication:

Chandigarh being the Capital of two States viz Punjab and Haryana is very well linked to the main towns, cities and nearby villages of these two states. Being an important place in north India, it is also very well linked to Delhi and the main towns of Jammu & Kashmir, Himachal Pradesh, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh and Uttaranchal. The total fleet strength of Chandigarh Transport Undertaking (CTU) has been 415 in 1998-99. The CTU carried 2.35 lakh passengers daily in 1998-99. There is a frequent local bus services for all areas of Chandigarh. The total loss of CTU stood at -402.16 lakh rupees in 1998-99. The number of registered motor vehicles in Chandigarh U.T. is given in the following table for the year 1997-98 and 1998-99:

#### Landscaping:

Thirty years ago, the present site of Chandigarh was a place of rural landscape of sprawling cooplands dotted with clumps of handy native trees and sleepy hamlets. As is common in most countryside a harmonious Man-and-Nature relationship existed then. The making of the city significantly altered that relationship. The agrarian landscape gave way to cityscape of Building blocks, streets, electro poles, water towers and the uniquitous automobile. Unlike most other modern cities, thanks to its planned landscaping, Chandigarh escapes being 'a concrete jungle and an asphalt desert'. While carrying out the precepts of town planning for Chandigarh, Le-Corbusier planned a hierarchy of green spaces, ranging from the backyard of a house to the city parks. These green spaces and other landscape features were meant to be an integral part of the fabric of the city and not an escape from it. Now that a long time has elapsed since the landscaping work was undertaken, it is opportune to have a look at the results, observe the chasm between precepts and performance and draw lessons there from.

To guide the landscaping of the city, a committee of experts was constituted to lay down the basic percepts and take decisions regarding their implementation. Tree Preservation Act was enacted, banning the willful felling of existing trees. The city has, thus, been able to preserve its venerable groves of mango (tali) and other

trees. Conspicuous among these are mango groves at the Capitol Complex and along the old ruins of the road from Chandigarh to Ropar. Le-Corbusier as a member of the landscape Committee suggested the preparation of list of different types of trees according to form, foliage and flowers suitable for plantation in Chandigarh.

#### Landform:

The City's natural landform has not been altered. It retains its original profile. Artificial mounds have been created around the Capitol Complex in accordance with Le-Corbusier's concept to dramatize the sculptural impact of the buildings. These mounds are covered with heterogeneous plantation of almonds, a shrub bearing yellow flowers, Bottle Brush, Pink Cassia Euclyptus and laburnum trees. The Leisure Valley has been developed into a gently rolling grassy meadow with meandering paths and clusters of flowering trees. The 'mallah' has been lined with a theme plantation of 'Bamboo' and 'Bottle Brush' trees to define its linear form. The mountains remain the most impactful element of landform; silkouting the cityscape of buildings and tali trees against their backdrop.

#### Water features:

The major water feature of the city is the Sukhna Lake. A vast sheet of shimmering water reflects the distant mountains during the day and the star-spangled sky at night. The promenade along the lake is sereened by thick plantation of cypress trees in a wall-like formation. The stone embankments in a sweeping curve encircles the lake. On the promenade an existing 'Pepal' tree with very broad crown acts as a nodal point of activity and visual focus. Le-Corbusier suggested the development of an artificial lake by damning the 'Sukhna Choe'. This would be a recreational zone.

In the recent times this lake is facing an acute problem of muddy water. Due to soil erosion the dissolved soil slips into the lake making the waters shallow and reducing the charm of the lake. Efforts are being made to prevent this soil erosion on one side and on the other the Chandigarh Administration has started Sharamdan movement in the lake of "City Beautiful" to maintain its dignity. Daily, thousands of school and college students, teachers, employees, officers, administrators take lively interest in removing the silt from the lake.

Thanks to the initiative taken by Shri Ashok Pradhan, the then Advisor to Chandigarh Administration that it has become a regular feature for the people of Chandigarh to participate in the Sharamdan.

#### Others features:

There are other small, manmade water features; fountains developed in the plazas of Sector 17 and in the Rose Garden as well as the water-basins in the Capitol Complex. These water features have little environmental impact, set as they are amidst the ambience of vast paved areas of concrete. They have, therefore, only aesthetic value environmentally and the urban trees are powerful symbols. These humanize the city and shape its materials to create a livable habitat. They modify the microclimate of the city and have a direct relationship with its architecture and skyline in terms of forms, colours, scale and texture. They can enhance desirable views or obliterate undesirable ones. These potential uses of trees in cities have been realised in Chandigarh in a limited way.

#### **Housing:**

Constituted in 1976, the Chandigarh Housing Board has augmented the housing stock in a big way. Mostly the Board has provided flats for different income groups. These include High Income Group (HIG), Middle Income Group (MIG) and Lower Income Group (LIG). The board by introducing a culture of living in flats has enabled thousands of households to own housing in this city, which was absent earlier. By December 1998 the Board constructed 40,544 housing units representing approximately 40 percent of the City's housing stock. The number of houses constructed/completed and allotted by the Chandigarh Housing Board during 1997-98 and 1998-99 is given next:

#### Civil Registration in the District:

Civil Registration is defined as continuous, permanent, compulsory recording of the occurrence and characteristics of the vital events (birth, death, marriage etc) as defined in and as provided through decree or regulation in accordance with the legal requirements of a Country. The birth registration may be required for establishing the proof of age for entry into school, service, obtaining a driving license, entering into legal contracts, marriage etc.

It also serves as the proof of healthy Indian Citizen. The death registration record may be required for settlement of inheritance, insurance claims, claiming family allowances and other social security benefits.

Registration of Births and Deaths in India is carried out under the provisions of the Registration of Births and Deaths Act, 1969. This Act, which replaced all the diverse laws that existed on the subject prior to its enforcement, unified the system of registration and made reporting and registration of Births and Deaths compulsory in the Country. In U.T. Chandigarh, the Act was enforced w.e.f. 01.04.1970 and notified in the Gazette on 25.06.1974 to carry out the purposes of Registration of Births and Deaths Act, 1969.

The information on the registered live births, deaths and infant deaths of Chandigarh based on the records of the Chandigarh Administration for the period of 1991-1999 is given as under:

It can be seen from the above statement that during 1991-99 number of registered births has increased in urban and all areas and shown a decline in rural areas during this period. The number of registered deaths has shown an increasing trend in all areas, urban as well as rural areas. There has been a decline in the number of registered infant deaths in urban and all areas whereas no infant death was registered in rural areas during 1999.

#### (xiv) Scope of Village and Town Directory

#### **Village Directory:**

The "Village Directory" is one of the traditional compilations of the Census. It gives the list of villages, their location numbers, their area, population, number of households, amenities such as educational, medical, drinking water, post and telegraph, commercial and co-operative banks,

agricultural, non-agricultural and other credit societies, recreational and cultural facilities, communication, approach to village, nearest town with distance, power supply, availability of newspaper and magazines, most important commodity manufactured and land use of each village.

Village is a statutory recognized unit having a definite boundary and separate land records. In case, a complete village is treated as an outgrowth of urban agglomeration, data on amenities for that village, have not been given in the Village Directory but shown along with the urban component. The villages which are considered as Census Towns, the amenities data are shown in the Town Directory. For those villages which have been partly merged in an outgrowth of U.A., the amenities data are shown in the Village Directory for that particular village.

The 'un-inhabited' villages (villages with no population) have been indicated as such after furnishing details in columns 1 to 3 i.e., Serial number, Name of village & location code and area of the village. The land use data for such villages are shown in col. 19 to 23.

#### **Town Directory:**

The Town Directory is presented for each town covering different aspects of urban life. Like 1991 census, in the present census also there are seven Statements to be included in the District Census Handbook for presentation of data. The seventh Statement relates to slums which was numbered as IV – A in 1991 Census. Statements I to VI contain data about growth, density, sex ratio, physical aspects of towns, communications, municipal finances, civic, medical, educational and other amenities and trade, commerce, Industry, Banking facilities. The Chandigarh Union Territory is a unidistrict and uni-tahsil territory and has only one town i.e. Chandigarh, hence the data for the only town of Chandigarh has been presented in these six Statements. Similarly the seventh Statement presents the data for slums.

**Statement I** shows status and growth history of the only town of Chandigarh in the District.

Column 2 in this Statement indicates class, name and civic administration status of a town (as in 2000). Class of the town indicated under this column has been introduced to facilitate the analysis of town directory data at the State/U.T. and at the national level. Column 6 presents area in Sq. kms. while Column 7 presents number of households including houseless households. Columns 8 to 18 give population and growth rate of towns since 1901. Column 19 presents density and Columns 20 to 22 present sex-ratio.

**Statement II** shows physical aspects and location of each town as in 1999. Column 2 shows the class and name of Town. Columns 3 to 5 show the rainfall and maximum and minimum temperature. Columns 6 to 13 show the name and distance of State HQ, district HQ, Tahsil HQ, nearest city with a population of one lakh and more, nearest city with a population of five lakh and more, Railway Station, Bus facility and Navigable river/canal from town.

**Statement III** shows the municipal finance of the Town. As there is only one town in Chandigarh District, the income and expenditure for the only town of Chandigarh has been presented in this Statement.

Statement IV provides information for civic and other amenities available to the Town. This Statement presents general population as well as the Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes population as per 2001 census under Columns 3, 4 and 5. Columns 6 to 20 present data regarding road length, system of sewerage, number of latrines, method of disposal of night soil, protected water supply, fire fighting service, electric connections for domestic, industrial and commercial as well as road lighting (points) and others.


**Statement V** gives information regarding educational, medical, recreational and cultural facilities available in the town. Population figures for 2001 census have also been presented for the only town of Chandigarh which will facilitate in analyzing data on facilities available to the people. Data pertaining to medical facilities have been obtained from Director Health Services and shown under Columns 4 and 5. The information on educational facilities have been shown under Column 6-15.

This Statement also shows, number of working women's hostels, recreational and cultural facilities available in the town under Columns 16 to 20.

**Statement VI** presents information in respect of trade, commerce, industry and banking services in the town. Columns 3 to 8 indicate three most important commodities exported and

manufactured in the Town. Information on number of banks available in the town have been presented under column 9 whereas Columns 10 and 11 show the number of agricultural and non-agricultural credit societies in the town.

**Statement VII** shows the civic amenities available to all the 15 slums falling in the jurisdiction of Chandigarh District.

# Note explaining the abbreviations used in the village directory

The Village Directory format has 23 columns and the details given under each column for the village are as follows:

#### Columns 1: Serial Number

Self explanatory. All the villages within the C.D. block are presented serially in the ascending order of their location code number.

# Columns 2: Name and Location Code Number of village.

The name and location code number of the village are shown against these columns. This also includes the forest and uninhabited villages.

#### Column 3: Area of the village

The area of the villages in hectares are given. Wherever the area figures was not furnished by the concerned department the column is left blank.

#### **Column 4: Total population**

The total population of the village as per 2001 Census is given against this column.

### Column 5: Number of households

The number of households as per 2001 Census is given in this column.

#### **Amenities:**

In column 6 to 23, availability in respect of different amenities such as education, medical, drinking water, post, telegraph, banks, credit societies, communication, power, approach road etc. in each village has been depicted with appropriate codes against the column concerned. Wherever the amenities are not available in the village, a dash (-) is shown in the column and next to it in brackets the distance in broad ranges viz. <5 kms., 5-10 kms. and 10+ kms of the nearest place where the facility is

available is given. Column wise details are given below:

#### Column 6: Educational

Classes upto class V included in Primary School. This will include nursery school, kindergarten school. Pre-basic school, pre-primary school, junior basic school upto class V.

Classes from VI to VIII are included in the middle school.

Classes from IX and X included in High secondary school. Classes XI and XII are included in senior secondary school.

In case of composite schools like middle school with primary school or secondary school with middle school, these are also included in the number of primary and middle schools, respectively.





### **Brief note on Primary Census Abstract**

The first census of the third millennium and twenty first century the Census of India, 2001 was the 14<sup>th</sup> continuous and uninterrupted Indian census since 1872. Thus, 2001 Census will provide data on population and its characteristics marking transition from one century and millennium to another.

The gigantic operation of Population Enumeration (considered by many to be the single largest and complex peace time administrative exercise in the world) was made possible due to the door to door universal canvassing of the Household Schedule by about 2 million enumerators and supervisors covering 593 districts, 5,463 sub-districts, 5,161 towns and 638,588 villages. The comprehensive Household Schedule which replaced the individual slip had three parts and two sides A and B. Part I contained the Location Particulars; Part II related to the Individual Particulars and Part III contained questions for Household engaged in Cultivation/Plantation. The part II of the Household Schedule had 39 columns and 23 questions all of which were universally canvassed and no sampling was resorted to during enumeration.

#### **Data Processing**

A quantum leap was made in the technology front while processing the Census 2001 data both for Houselisting and Population Enumeration. The Census schedules for both the phases were scanned through high speed scanners in fifteen data centers across the country and hand-written data from the schedules were converted into digitized form through Intelligent Character Reading (ICR) software for creation of ASCII records for further processing. The designing and formatting of the Household Schedule had to be done very carefully using specialized software so as to ensure uniformity, which was an essential prerequisite for scanning. The selection of appropriate state-of-art technology in data processing has made it possible to produce all the Houselisting as well as Population Enumeration tables on full count basis for the first time in the history of Census. For Census 2001, about 202 million schedules consisting of about 1,028 million records were scanned and processed within a span of only 10 months starting October, 2002.

#### Task Force on Quality Assurance

After the data is processed, it is expedient on the part of the data producing agency to satisfy itself about its quality before putting the same in public domain. This has to be done mainly through the process of internal consistency, comparison with similar data in the past and also through validation with likewise data, if available, from external sources. Quite often the local knowledge and perception has to be brought into play to understand both the existing and the new emerging trends of population distribution and characteristics. The other very important aspect of the data quality is to ensure complete coverage of all geographical areas especially for the population enumeration phase where the data is disseminated right up to the village level in the rural areas and the ward level in the urban areas. Thus ensuring the complete coverage and correct geographical linkage of each enumeration block was one of the major planks of the quality control, specially for small area population statistics.

A very comprehensive check and edit mechanism was put in place to objectively examine the preliminary Census 2001 Population Enumeration results and finally clear them for use. The responsibility of the final clearance of data was with the Task Force on Quality Assurance (TFQA), headed by the Registrar General and Census Commissioner, India. The other members of the TFQA were the Heads and senior officers of the Census Division, Data Processing Division, Map Division, Demography Division and Social Studies Division. The Directors of Census Operations were co-opted as members whenever the TFQA discussed the data for their States/Union territories. The Directors and their senior officers were required to make detailed presentations of data for their own State both in respect to the quality and the coverage and only after the full possible satisfication of the TFQA, the population data was cleared.

There has been a major departure in Census 2001 from the past in respect of the procedure followed for finalization of the Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes population. In the earlier censuses, the total Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes populations were finalized at the time of the manual compilation of the Primary Census Abstracts (PCA) at the Regional Tabulation Offices which were specially set up for this purpose. The individual Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes population for each state was finalized much later based on manual coding done by the coders. In 2001 Census, each individual Scheduled Caste and the Scheduled Tribe have been coded directly on the computers by the Data Entry Operators through a process known as Computer Assisted Coding (CAC) and taken up along with the processing of PCA data. The CAC process involves pulling down, from the relevant dictionary of the Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes, on the computer screen and coding from the dictionary by referring to the image of the specific individual entry in the Household Schedule appearing on the screen. The CAC of the response on Religion, wherever required, was also undertaken along with the processing of PCA. This is because the Scheduled Castes status had to be determined in relation to the religion of the individual. Two Special Task Forces, one on Religion and the other on Scheduled Castes/ Scheduled Tribes were constituted for scrutiny and appropriate classification of these responses.

The main task of the Special Task Force on Religion was to appropriately merge or group the new responses encountered and code it into the appropriate religious community based on available literature and local knowledge. The Special Task Force on Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes examined the different Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes entries encoun-tered and classified these into appropriate category of the Scheduled Castes or the Scheduled Tribes principally based on the Presidential Notification and the available literature. Thus a very systematic and scientific mechanism was operationalised to firm up the individual religion and the individual Scheduled Castes/Tribes returns. The Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes population in 2001 Census, is thus being finalized by aggregating the population data for individual Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes at appropriate geographical levels.

The entire work relating to the data validation and scrutiny was completed by all the States/Union Territories under the overall supervision and monitoring of the Census Division of the Office of the Registrar General, India with active cooperation and support of the Social Studies Division, Data Processing Division, Data Dissemination Division and Map Division.

#### **Primary Census Abstract**

The Primary Census Abstract which is yet another important publication of 2001 Census gives basic information on Area, Total Households, Total population, Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes population, Population in the age group 0-6, Literates, Main workers and Marginal workers classified by the four broad industrial categories, namely, (i) Cultivators, (ii) Agricultural labourers, (iii) Household Industry Workers, and (iv) Other workers and also Non-workers. The characteristics of the Total Population includes Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, Institutional and Houseless population and are presented by sex and rural-urban residence. This data is presented at different levels, namely, India, States/Union territories, Districts and Cities, Urban Agglomerations (Population 1,00,000 and above) in three different tables. In addition, the Appendix of said publication provides Houseless and Institutional Households and their population by residence and sex for 2001 for India, States and Union territory.

Apart from the India and State/Union Territory volumes for Primary Census Abstract, the District Census Handbook contains District Primary Census Abstract, Appendix to District Primary Census Abstract, Primary Census Abstract for Scheduled Castes, Primary Census Abstract for Scheduled Tribes, Village Primary Census Abstract and Urban Primary Census Abstract of the concerned district in the State.

It was for the first time at the 1981 Census that the Primary Census Abstract (PCA) was brought out for the Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes separately on the pattern of General Primary Census Abstract. This practice was continued in 1991 also. In the 1961 and 1971 Censuses, such data were made available in Table C-VIII-Social and Cultural table and to some extent in the series 'Special Tables for Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes'.

The format of Primary Census Abstract has been restructured slightly in the 2001 Census as compared

to that of 1991 Census. The nine-fold industrial classification of main workers given in the Primary Census Abstract of 1991 Census has been discontinued and its place, four-fold industrial classification of both 'main workers' and 'marginal workers' are included. In 1981 census only main workers were presented in to four categories. One of the novel features of the primary census abstract of 1991 census was the presentation of data of the population of age group 0-6 is continued in

2001 Census also. This will help the data users in better analysis and understanding of this literacy data.

### Level of presentation in District Census Handbooks:

The Primary Census Abstract data in different PCAs are presented at different levels. The level of presentation of Primary Census Abstracts are as under:

The PCA Data for villages was presented C.D. Block wise for the first time in 1991 Census. This practice is continued in 2001 Census also. The data for each C.D. Block is presented both for rural and urban areas separately. All the villages within the C.D. Block constitute the rural portion and the Census Towns and Outgrowths are shown under the urban portion of the C.D. Block. In case a C.D. Block is spread over two or more districts, than portion which falls within the district is presented, the data pertaining to remaining portion of the C.D. Block is presented in the concerned District Census Handbook. The data in the Urban Primary Census Abstract for each town as well as for town with outgrowths in the district are presented. The data for all the wards and the outgrowths of the town(s) are also presented separately below the concerned

The District Primary Census Abstract is presented in 59 columns. The Primary Census Abstract for Scheduled Castes and Primary Census Abstract for Scheduled Tribes are presented in 52 columns. The Village Primary Census Abstract and Urban Primary Census Abstract are presented in 58 columns.

The concepts and definitions used in the column heading are explained under the sub heading 'Census Concepts' in the Analytical Note. The term 'Total Population' includes the Scheduled Castes, the Scheduled Tribes, the Institutional and the Houseless populations. The explanation regarding area figures

presented at various level in the Primary Census Abstracts are as follows:

#### **Area Figures**

The area figures supplied by local revenue authorities of the district in respect of tahsils, Police Stations and by the local bodies in respect of towns are given in square kilometers. The area figures of the villages supplied by the Tahsildars in acres have been converted and shown in hectares. The area figures of the C.D. Block is the total of the village areas coming under each C.D. Block. The area figures for the district are the same as adopted by the Surveyor General of India to maintain uniformity at the national level. The total area figures of all the tahsils/ C.D. Blocks within the district may not tally with area figures of the district because former represents land use area only. Similarly, the total of all the villages may not tally with the entire rural of Police Station/Tahsil. The difference may be due to the fact that while the area covered by hills, forests and rivers etc., have been accounted in the Tahsils and P.S. level the same may not be covered under the area of the villages. Apart from this it may also differ due to varying methods of computation adopted at different levels.

An appendix to District Primary Census Abstract has also been furnished showing urban enumeration block-wise particulars on Total Population, the Scheduled Castes Population and the Scheduled Tribes Population for each town.

The above annexure gives the number of villages under each gram panchayat. In Chandigarh Union Territory there are 24 villages which have 17 panchayats. Village Shahpur and Dadumajra have a common panchayat. 5 villages namely Nizampur Kumbra, Nizampur Burail, Jhumroo, Burail (R) and Bair majra do not have any panchayat. Village Chahar-

Tarf-Burail is uninhabited. In addition, this annexure gives us the area of each village, number of households, total population and Scheduled Castes population.

#### Annexure II

# Note on fertility, child mortality and migration – 1991 Census

#### **Fertility:**

As soon as the social life started, the need of fertility has been felt. History tells us that in the past people used to pray to have fertility in barren women. But with the passage of time people realized that this is not enough and reliable. The increase in literacy, made people to think that scientific means are more reliable. Fecundity is a biological potential psychological capacity to participate in reproduction or the physical capacity for bearing children. In demography, the word fertility is used in relation to the actual production of children or occurrence of births specially live births. Fertility is a measure of rate at which population adds to itself by births and normally assessed by relating number of birth to size

of some section of the population, such as number of married couples or number of women of child bearing age. In other words, it is a major component of population growth.

In the 1991 Census four questions on fertility were canvassed on universal basis. These related to age at marriage, number of surviving children, number of children ever born alive, and whether any child was born during the last one year. The first three questions were asked to all ever married women and the last question related to currently married woman.

The fertility indicators on which information has been gathered are Age Specific Fertility Rate (ASFR), Age Specific Marital Fertility Rate (ASMFR), General Marital Fertility Rate (GMFR) and Total Marital Fertility Rate (TMFR) are based on the question on births during last one year.

A perusal of the above table shows that there has been a decline in all the indicators of fertility except Total Marital Fertility Rate during 1981-91.

#### **Child Mortality:**

The estimates presented here have been obtained using the data on the number of children ever born and number of children surviving to ever married woman. Information on questions on children ever born and children surviving canvassed for all ever married women have been tabulated by the age of the mother. From this, estimates of child mortality q(i) have been worked out using Brass technique, where q(i) is the probability of a new born child dying before the age I=1, 2, 3 and 5.

It is observed from the above Statement that the Child mortality estimates in the District of Chandigarh have decreased in 1991 when compared to those of 1981.

#### **Migration:**

Migration is the third component of population change, the other two being mortality and fertility.

A person is considered as a migrant by place of birth if the place in which he/she is enumerated during the census is other than the place of his/her birth.

Similarly a person is considered as a migrant by place of last residence if the place in which he/she is enumerated during the census is other than his/her place of immediate last residence outside the village or town and not simply in another house or locality in the same village or town.

Certain aspects concerning temporary movement/ migration of people has been explained below as these are important components concerning migration:

- (i) Migration of persons in search of job is high in the country. In many cases such migrants are only seasonal in nature. People migrate to other places for work in a particular season and come back again to their usual place of residence after three or four months. All such workers are treated as migrants. Similarly, if a person moved to any other place for attending short term vocational or educational course that lasted for only few months of a year, she/he too were considered as a migrant.
- (ii) Where a person had merely gone out to another place or had been shifting from one place to another purely on tour, pilgrimage, visit to hospital for treatment or for temporary business purposes, such persons are not deemed to have had another residence different from the place where she/he or her/his family normally resides. She/he is not considered as migrant.
- (iii) A woman temporarily moves into a hospital or to her parents or other relative's house for delivery and if the hospital or the parents/ relatives houses is in a place different from usual place of residence, the place where the

hospital or parents/relative's house is the place of last residence of the child but not of the mother.

A new response category 'Moved after birth' was added in Census of India 2001 in the question on 'reasons for migration' to bring out additional migration patterns. Natural calamities or distress migration as a reason for migration for last residence migrants included in 1991 Census, is covered under category of 'Others'. The reason for migration has been determined as applicable at the time of migration and not in reference to any point of time after that. For example, if a person had moved from the place of her/his last residence for the purpose of education and subsequently at some point of time got employment there only, the reason for migration would be 'education' and not 'work/employment'.

#### Rural - Urban components of migration:

Rural or Urban status in respect of migrants have been determined as applicable at the time of migration and not with reference to any point of time after that.

The flow of migrants consists of four streams viz. rural to rural, rural to urban, urban to rural and urban to urban. Migration is the third component of population change, the other two being mortality and fertility. A person is considered as a migrant by place of birth if the place in which he is enumerated during the Census is other than the place of his birth. Similarly a person is considered as a migrant by place of last residence if the place in which he is enumerated during the Census is other than his place of immediate last residence.

#### **Internal and International migration:**

The migrational movements are of three types:

- (i) Migration within the State itself with its components
  - a. Migration within the District of enumeration (intra District migration)
  - b. Migration from one District of State to another District of State (inter District migration)
- (ii) Migration from one State to another State of the country (inter State migration)

(iii) Migration from one country to another country.

The first two streams together constitute internal migration while the last type of movement is called international migration

#### Why people migrate?

As in 1981 Census, the reasons for migration were elicited in 1991 Census also. The reasons for migration were broadly categorized as

- (1) Employment
- (2) Business
- (3) Education
- (4) Family moved

- (5) Marriage
- (6) Natural calamities like draught, flood etc. and
- (7) Other reasons.

Reasons for migration have been elicited only with reference to movement from place of last residence.

## Impact of migration:

Growth of population of a particular place depends upon natural increase due to excess of births over deaths and migration. Knowledge of trends in migration helps in future planning of a region. On the basis of inmigrants by place of birth there were 403,241 inmigrants in Chandigarh Union Territory in 1991 comprising 221,716 males and 181,525 females.

If we analyse the above table we find that the overall specific marital fertility rate is the highest in the age-group 20-24 followed by the age-group 25-29 in Chandigarh Union Territory. The third highest rate has been returned in the age-group 15-19. The age-specific marital fertility rate goes on declining in all the higher age-groups, with the percentage of decline being

higher in the older age-group.

A comparison of the age specific marital fertility rates for 1981 and 1991 shows that the rates are higher in the younger age-groups 15-19, 20-24, 25-29 and 30-34 in both rural and urban areas. There is a decline in both general marital fertility rate (GMFR) and total marital fertility rate (TMFR) in 1991 as compared to 1981.

The parity data in the above table shows that percentage of ever married women with two children is the highest in all the educational levels in Chandigarh Union Territory at 27.2 percent for total, 20.9 percent for rural areas and 27.8 percent for urban areas. It is further evident that in case of illiterate the percentage of ever-married women

with 5 or more children at 26.4 percent for total, 22.3 percent for rural and 27.2 percent for urban is the maximum. This percentage goes on decreasing with the increase in the educational levels and touches the lowest level at 1.1 percent in urban areas for those who are graduate and above with 5 or more children.

## Main religions in the district/tahsil as per 2001 census

Religion forms an integral part of Indian Social System. For an Indian, it is a way of life rather than a faith. Indian Census, since its inception is collecting data on religion and presenting the same in its reports. In the pre-independence Census reports, the data on religion was being presented for 9 major religions viz., Hindus, Muslims, Tribals, Christians, Sikhs, Jains, Buddhists, Parsis, Jewish and others. However, since the 1951 Census the data on religion has been presented for 6 major religions viz., Hindus, Muslims, Christians, Sikhs, Jains and Buddhists. Besides, the minor religions have been classified under the category of 'others'. The data on religion collected and presented by the Indian Census is the basic data of immense use for the researchers, anthropologists, sociologists, demographers, administrators, planners and even for a common man.

In 1991 the Indian Census collected the religion data in question No. 8 of the Individual slips and

recorded the same under the six major religions, other religions were recorded in actual as returned by the respondent and classified under the category of 'others'.

#### India - State differentials:

The comparative data of the country and the Union Territory of Chandigarh presented in Table No. V-1 reveals that the religion wise concentration of population in Chandigarh Union Territory is of two major religions Hindus and Sikhs. Hindus comprise 78.6 percent followed by Sikhs 16.1 percent. Percentage of Hindus in Chandigarh Union Territory is on a little lower side with 78.6 percent when compared with the national average 80.5 percent. Sikhs are returned on the higher side with 16.1 percent with the national average of only 1.9 percent. Muslims in Chandigarh Union Territory are only about one fourth (3.9 percent) of the National average of 13.4 percent. All other religions are in a meager number when compared with the percentages of the country as a whole.

This table shows that Hindu community is the largest religious community residing in Chandigarh U.T., which comprises of a total population of 707,978 out of which 403,191 are males while 304,757 are females in 2001. The total Sex Ratio of the said community comes to 756 females per 1,000 males. Second rank is occupied by Sikh community, which comprises of 145,175 persons.

When we take up the break up of these figures sex wise 76,000 are males while 69,175 are females. The Sex Ratio of this community comes to 910. Muslims form the third position comprising 35,548 persons with 21,539 males and 14,009 females and the Sex Ratio of Muslims comes to 650. Of all the religious communities Christians and Jains have a higher sex ratio of 932 and 940 respectively.

#### Annexure VI

# Marital status of population as per 1991 and 2001 census

Like age, marital status is also an important demographic data collected and produced by the Census organisation. The marital status of each individual has been recorded on the basis of whether one was married, currently married, widowed, separated if he or she has never been married at any time before. A currently married person is one whose marriage, whether for the first time or another time subsist at the time of Enumeration with the spouse living. Persons who are recognised by custom or society as married

and persons in stable-de-facto union are also classified as currently married. A widowed person is one whose husband or wife is dead and who has not been married again. A person who has been separated from wife or husband and is living apart with no apparent intention of living together again or who has been divorced either by decree of a law court or by an accepted social or religions custom but has not married, is classified as separated or divorced.

The following table shows the proportion of population by marital status in Chandigarh U.T. during 1991 and 2001.

The pre page table gives us the percentage of population by sex and age-group 0-9, 10-14, 15-19, 20-24, 25-29, 30-34, 35-39, 40-44, 45-49, 50-54, 55-59, 60-64, 65-69, 70-74, 75-79, 80+ and Age not Stated according to their marital status. It is evident from the above table that the entire population in the age-group 0-9 is never married. The percentage of never married shows a declining trend with every increasing age group upto the age group of 50-54. Similarly in

the age-group 10-14 only 1.0 percent are married i.e. 0.6 percent males and 1.3 percent females. The percentage of married shows an increasing trend with every increasing age group upto the age group of 35-39. It further shows that the percentage of widowed is the maximum in the age-group 80+ with 48.6 percent. The percentage of divorced or separated is found maximum in the age-groups 30-34, 35-39, 40-44 and 80+ with 0.4 percent respectively.

### **Annexure VII**

# Age, Sex and Education in the district, 1991 and 2001 census

Literacy is an important question asked in every Census. In the first three Censuses ending with 1891, the population was classified as "Learning", "Literates" and "Illiterate". The data collected on this basis was reported to have been distorted as educated persons who were still learning or students returned themselves as literates. This three-fold distinction was discontinued in 1901 and the population was divided into "Literate" and "Illiterate".

A person who can both read and write with understanding in any language is taken as literate. A person who can merely read but can not write is not literate. It is not necessary that a person who is literate

should have received any formal education or should have passed any minimum educational standard. Children upto the age of 6 years have been treated as illiterate in 1991 Census even if they were going to school and have learnt to read and write a few words. At the time of 1971 and 1981 Censuses, Children upto the age of 4 years were recorded as illiterate. Since ability to read and write with understanding is not ordinarily achieved until one had some schooling or had at least some time to develop these skills, it was felt by the Ministry of Human Resources & Development and the Planning Commission that the population aged 7 years and above is to be classified as literate or illiterate. In view of this, in the 2001 Census the question on literacy was canvassed only for population aged 7 years and above.

The above table VII-1 indicates the male-female difference in literacy rates for the States/U.T.s during 1991 and 2001 Census. When the male-female difference in literacy rates is analysed, a somewhat different picture comes up. A distinctive index emerges with a tendency to be upward in a State or Union Territory with low literacy rates and downward in a State or Union Territory with high literacy rates. The two indices may show quite different results

because at low levels of literacy a small male-female difference is compatible with either a high or a low sex ratio, whereas at high levels of literacy a small male-female difference necessarily means a male-female ratio close to one. Therefore, in a particular State/U.T. trend in the male-female difference may indicate a widening sex differential, while the trend in the Sex Ratio among literates simultaneously may indicate a narrowing sex differential.

It is apparent from the previous page table VII-2 that there is a steady improvement in the literates among both males and females right from 1901 onwards. The growth in female literacy rate is, however, more rapid and

conspicuous while the male literacy has risen from 9.8 in 1901 to 75.3 in 2001, the female literacy rose from 0.6 to 53.7 within the same period registering a substantial growth of more than 65 times.

It is evident from the above table VII-3 that in 1991 in all States and Union Territories the male literacy rates exceeded the corresponding female rates by a significant margin, however, the size of the margin had a considerable variability. Among all the States, Kerala is the only State where the gap of Literacy Rates among males and females is quite low. The States which are below 70 percent male literacy mark are Arunachal Pradesh (63.8), Bihar

(59.7), J & K (66.6), Jharkhand (67.3), Meghalaya (65.4) and U.P. (68.8). Among the Union Territories, Dadra & Nagar Haveli is the only Union Territory where the male literacy rate is only 71.2 whereas almost all other Union Territories have registered Literacy Rates more than 85 percent. In spite of the large-scale increase in literacy, more than 24 percent males and 46 percent females in the country still continue to be illiterate.

In the Union Territory of Chandigarh the rural literacy rate has increased from 59.1 percent to 75.6 percent within the decade 1991-2001. The male literacy rate has registered an increase of about 10 percent while the female literacy has also shown about

19 percent increase during the decade.

When we take up the urban areas of Chandigarh Union Territory, we find that Chandigarh MC has literacy rate of 82.6 percent with male and female literacy of 86.8 and 77.4 percent respectively during 2001 Census.

The previous page table highlights the number of educational institutions by type catering to the rural and urban components of Chandigarh Union Territory. These data are non-census and were collected in 1999 for village and town directories. There are two polytechnics in the Chandigarh Union Territory and both are situated in Chandigarh City. There is only one Engineering College and Medical Colleges in Chandigarh City. Out of 54 Higher Secondary/Intermediate/PUC Colleges/Junior Colleges 51 are located in Chandigarh while 3 are located in rural areas.

Of the seventy three Secondary/Matriculation schools 62 schools are located in Chandigarh City alone, while 11 schools are located in rural areas. Of the 54 Junior Secondary and Middle Schools 33 are located in Chandigarh City and the rest 21 schools are located in rural areas. Out of a total number of 101 Primary schools 53 schools are located in Chandigarh City, while 48 schools are in rural areas. As far as Adult Literacy Centres are concerned, a total number of 400 Adult Literacy centres are located in Chandigarh City.

While examining the Age Specific Literacy Rate in the age-groups 7-9, 10-14 and 15-19 it has been observed during 2001 census in Chandigarh U.T. that the age-group 10-14 is of special interest, because the maximum number of literates are the school going children falling in this age-group i.e. 91.7 percent for

persons, 92.5 percent for males and 90.8 percent for females. The literacy rate (84.8 percent) has worked out in the age-group 7-9 in 2001 as compared to 83.4 percent in 1991. The Literacy Rate for 10-14 age-group has increased from 87.2 percent to 89.5 percent in 2001 Census.

The above table presents percentage of literates by sex and highest educational level attained. When we analyse the figures of this table we find that the maximum number of literates are matric / higher secondary / Non-technical, technical diploma or certificate not equal to degree i.e. 30.3 percent during 1991 where as the lowest percentage is of

middle.

When we analyse the figures of literates during 2001 census we find that the trend is the same with 31.8 percent literates as matric / higher secondary / Non-technical, technical diploma or certificate not equal to degree. The lowest percentage is also the same with 14.0 percent.

# Distribution of different mother tongues returned in 1991 and 2001 census

Language is a critical attribute of India's population which is marked with a pluri-lingual and pluri-cultural society. Language in itself is a group of mother tongues. It was on the basis of language that the country was reorganized into States in 1956.

It is customary for the Indian Census to collect data on mother tongue of every person at every Census. Mother tongue is defined as the language spoken in childhood by the person's mother to the person. If the mother died in infancy, the language mainly spoken in the person's home in childhood is to be recorded as the mother tongue. In case o infants and deaf mutes the language usually spoken by the mother is recorded. The instructions to the enumerators for recording the name of the language returned by the respondent as mother tongue are summarized as under:

- 1. Record the name of the language returned by the respondent as mother tongue in full, whatever is the name of the language and do not use abbreviations.
- 2. Do not try to determine if the language returned by a person is a dialect of another language.
- 3. Do not try to establish any relationship between religion and mother tongue.
- 4. Record the language as returned for each person and do not enter into any argument.
- 5. Do not try to record any language other than what is returned by the respondent.

Question 11 aimed to ascertain if the person knows any other language(s), and entries up to two

languages, in order of proficiency were to be recorded under this question. In this regard the person need not necessarily be able to read and write the language(s). It is enough if the person has a working knowledge and is able to converse with understanding.

There has not been any perceptible change in the definition of 'mother tongue' adopted by the Indian Census for the earlier censuses. A brief analysis has been made on the basis of 1991 and 2001 Censuses. In 1991 also Table C-7 shows the distribution of languages/mother tongues which returned 10,000 or more speakers each at all India level (including of mother tongues grouped under each) for the District, Police Station etc. with total, rural, urban and male/female break-ups. The unclassified mother tongues and the mother tongues having less than 10,000 speakers have been relegated to "others" mother tongue category. The table divided into Part A – Scheduled languages with the mother tongues grouped under each and part B - Non- Scheduled languages with the mother tongues grouped under each.

According to 1991 Census there are 18 Scheduled and 96 Non-Scheduled languages in India. Thriteen of these eighteen languages namely; Assamese, Bengali, Gujarati, Hindi, Kashmiri, Konkani, Marathi, Nepali, Oriya, Punjabi, Sanskrit, Sindhi and Urdu belong to the Indo-Aryan branch. Four of them namely; Kannada, Malayalam, Tamil and Telgu belong to Dravidian family, while Manipuri belongs to Tibeto-Burmese family. English, the quite commonly used as a link language belongs to Indo-European Languages. The distribution of speakers of Scheduled Languages in the State and for the district as per Census 1991 is portrayed in Table VIII(a).

In part A of Table VIII, 22 major languages have been given, which are specified in Schedule VIII of the Constitution of India.

Part B relates to languages not specified in the eight schedule of the constitution of India.

A study of the tables VIII-1 Part A and B gives a clear idea that although there are as many as 42 languages spoken in Chandigarh in 1991 census and 44 languages in 2001 census. Hindi speaking people are in dominant majority followed by Punjabi speaking population.
